# Students in the spotlight at Quantum Arts 2014 Finale performance on Thursday, March 20

Just eight weeks ago, Rahma Mairane was a shy 12 year old who only demonstrated her acting skills at home in front of her parents. Tomorrow afternoon, she'll show off her newfound confidence onstage as part of a drama program taught by professional actors at Prairie Theatre Exchange. Being part of the Winnipeg School Division's Quantum Arts Program has helped the Grade 6 student at Sister MacNamara School come out of her shell, make new friends and discover her own talent.

"Acting is a very new experience, and also fun. I like that you get to express your feelings," says Mairane. "I was really nervous at first, but that changed after a few weeks."

More than 100 Grade 5 to 8 students like Mairane have spent the last eight weeks learning to dance, act, sculpt and more. The students from 42 schools in the Winnipeg School Division will take the stage on Thursday, March 20 to exhibit their newly acquired artistic abilities for their parents, educators and school trustees at the **Quantum Arts Program 2014 Finale**.

Where: Muriel Richardson Auditorium at The Winnipeg Art Gallery, 300 Memorial Blvd.

Students will demonstrate their skills in dance, theatre and visual art at the Finale, after training with professionals at The Royal Winnipeg Ballet School, Prairie Theatre Exchange and The Winnipeg Art Gallery Studio.

Jordan Unger, 10, has gone from doodling cars and aliens and never having been to an art gallery to working on a clay sculpture that will be exhibited at the WAG. "It's a really neat way to learn more about how to do things with different raw materials. It's structured, but we learned that art can be whatever you want," says Unger, in Grade 5 at Glenelm School.

Unger says he's excited that his art, along with sculptures by the other Quantum students who studied at the WAG, will be part of the gallery's Through the Eyes of a Child exhibit beginning March 29. "I like that it's the artwork of kids, not just the artwork of other people that looks like the artwork of kids," he says.

Anthea Quinto, 11, was nervous at first about learning ballet, jazz and modern dance at the RWB, because she had never taken a dance class before. But she's now confident in her skills going into the final performance: "By the finale we'll have every single move perfect," says the Grade 5 student at Lord Nelson School.

#### Quantum Arts Program – by the numbers

100 – number of Grade 5 to 8 students in the Winnipeg School Division that take part in the program every year 4 – hours per week the students study with the professional actors, dancers and artists (two hours every Tuesday and Thursday afternoon during school hours)

8 – number of weeks the program lasts

3 – number of streams the students can enter: Classical Ballet, Jazz and Modern Dance at the Royal Winnipeg Ballet School; Creative Drama at Prairie Theatre Exchange; and Art at the Winnipeg Art Gallery 1989-90 – School year in which the Quantum Arts Program was launched
