
Winnipeg Adult Education Centre Community Report 2017-2018

The Winnipeg Adult Education Centre provides students with the opportunities to achieve academic success and personal growth in a mature adult environment. A unique facility, WAEC provides access at seven locations and meets the needs of a variety of learners.







About our school

The Winnipeg Adult Education Centre consists of a main campus, the Adolescent Parent Centre, and four Adult Learning Centres: Kaakiyow li moond likol, WAEC Off Campus: River Osborne, Taking Charge of Academics, and T.E.R.F.; as well as an off-site English as an Additional Language Program. Each of these sites serves a different demographic of our student population.

The Winnipeg Adult Education Centre (WAEC) provides the opportunity for adult learners to; upgrade their high school course marks; attain a Mature High School Diploma; learn or improve English language skills - to over 2000 students per year. Our main campus boasts of high quality academic programs, creative computer and art courses, a vibrant student/resource room, a resource rich library, and a knowledgeable career advi-

sor. The Adolescent Parent Centre provides a high school and parenting program for pregnant and parenting teens and young women. Child Care is provided so students can bring their children, aged 2 and under, to school with them. Students and staff at the ALC's also have access to all the aforementioned resources. (43 teachers, 2 Guidance Counselors, a Career advisor, a Teacher-Librarian, a Computer Tech, a Lab Assistant and Educational Assistants.

Priorities for 2017-18

1. To provide robust and comprehensive education, equitable access, diverse opportunity and a supportive learning environment for all students.

- Provided P.D. for staff that pertained to Cultural Proficiency. We provided resources and supports for students that were gained from the P.D., including referrals to agencies who can provide extra assistance to students.
- Continuous Intake program was developed for students to register at anytime throughout the second semester and provide opportunity for course completion.

2. Further improve school attendance and graduation rates through the exploration of additional programs and strategies.

- Adapted assessment practices were introduced in all classes resulting increased pass rates on English and Math Provincial exams.
- Added additional courses to support our learners (ecredits).
- Timetable modified to reflect the needs of our learners.
- To further develop initiatives and innovative approaches addressing individual student needs and accessibility requirements, mental health issues, childcare needs, and nutritional needs.
- EAL adaptations for ELA and Math, clarifying the process for struggling students, differentiated instructional strategies throughout the year.

 Healthy Schools Grant provided a breakfast program every Friday and during exam weeks to relieve stress and provide extra nurturing for those in need.

4. To further develop communications and partnerships with the communities we serve.

 Established partnership with MPI (Drivers Ed), Downtown YMCA, Booth College and Opportunities for Employment.

5. To strengthen and enhance sustainable development.

- Continued partnership with Green Action Centre and Kiwanis to ensure effective composting.
- Clothing and used household item takeaway.
- Increased education and signage regarding school waste management.
- Increased green footprint within the school plants on all floors.

6. Continuing to increase leadership capacity and competency within schools.

- Department head council and steering committees enhanced leadership opportunities and built leadership capacity.
- Professional Development opportunities were encouraged to all staff throughout the school year.

Priorities for 2018-19

1. To provide robust and comprehensive education, equitable access, diverse opportunity and a supportive learning environment for all students.

- An Indigenous teacher is hired to focus on developing supports for enrollment, retention and credit acquisitions for Indigenous students.
- Courses for Mathematics and English will be available online to address the barrier of course completion rates due to attendance barriers.

2. Further improve school attendance and graduation rates through the exploration of additional programs and strategies.

- A continuous intake model will be implemented all year to increase participation rates.
- A literacy and numeracy block will be added to the timetable to address the need for prepatory courses to enable more student success at the credit level courses.
- To further develop initiatives and innovative approaches addressing individual student needs and accessibility requirements, mental health issues, childcare needs, and nutritional needs.
- Creating a school community and sense of belonging will be a top priority at the WAEC.
- A continuous intake program staffed by teachers, an EA and guidance will increase access to programming throughout the school year.

- Community partnerships are being developed to welcome new students and open dialogue with community organizations that support adult learners.
- Indigenous agencies and services will be partnered with to attract and support learners.
