Answer:


No. In the interest of safety <u>students must</u> <u>always cross at the corners where patrols</u> <u>are stationed</u>. They must not use alley ways.

Question?

Is there a junk food policy at Glenelm School?

Answer:

Yes. Junk food is not allowed at Glenelm School. This includes chips, pop, chocolate bars, etc.



Question?

Can toys and valuables be brought to school?

Answer:

No. This includes all toys, personal electronics and cell phones etc.

Question?

What are the arrangements for drop off and pick up of nursery and kindergarten children with regards to time?

Answer:

Students must be dropped off and picked up at the classroom door by a parent or pre-determined responsible adult. Students must be picked up promptly at their dismissal time. Children are not permitted to drop off/pick up nursery or kindergarten students.

Question?

What happens with the scheduling of kindergarten classes with regard to the winter concert?

Answer:

Kindergarten classes are rescheduled for the afternoon the day before the winter concert (for the dress rehearsal) and the day of the winter concert (for the afternoon performance).

Did you remember to wash your hands today?

Did you remember to wash your hands today? When we forget to wash our hands, or don't wash them properly, we can spread germs to other people, or give them to ourselves by touching our noses, eyes, and mouths. Hand washing is the most effective way to keep germs from spreading and to keep us from getting sick. Unwashed or poorly washed hands can spread colds, flu, infections, strep throat, diarrhea, influenza, hepatitis A, and intestinal problems.

We can pick up germs and viruses from objects, such as doorknobs and stair railings, shaking hands, and putting your mouth on a telephone receiver.

How long does it really take? If you washed your hands today, did you wash them correctly? Here are simple steps to scrubbing those germs away - Use warm water, lather hands with soap, rub hands together for at least 10 seconds (singing "Happy Birthday" is the perfect length of time), rinse with warm water, and pat hands dry with paper towel. When

there is no soap or water available, one alternative is to use waterless hand scrubs (on wipes or in a rinse).


When did you wash your hands? Did you use soap? What have you done since you washed? Did you know that one in three people do NOT wash their hands after using the bathroom? We should be washing our hands:

- After using the bathroom;
- After blowing nose, sneezing, or coughing;
- Before eating or handling food;
 After handling uncooked meat;
- After taking out the trash;
- After changing a diaper;
- After handling money; and
- After playing with a pet.

Don't under estimate the power of hand washing! The few seconds it takes could save you a trip to the doctor's office.


GLENELM SCHOOL'S MISSION STATEMENT

At Glenelm School we provide a safe, respectful, friendly and caring environment for learning.

We foster productive and responsible citizenship by practicing personal responsibility, understanding, acceptance of others, cooperation and teamwork.

We believe that a quality education is a life-long process involving physical, mental, emotional and social development.

We believe that we need to develop creative thinking, a love for learning, self-esteem and respect for others.



1. School Hours

The outside bell rings at 8:50 and 12:55 for student entry. Morning classes begin at 9:00 AM, afternoon classes at 1:00 PM. Students are dismissed as follows:

Kindergarten at 11:30 AM Grades 1 to 6 at 12:00 noon

All afternoon students at 3:30 PM

2. Office Hours Regular school days: 8:15 AM to 4:00 PM

Public holidays: office is closed

3. Answering Machine

Outside of regular office hours an answering machine is available for messages. Occasionally during the day the secretary may have to leave the office briefly. The answering machine will also be turned on at these times.

4. Call Back System

Please call or send a note to let us know if your child will be absent. We will call you if your child is absent and we haven't heard from you but it saves time if you notify us. "Call Backs" begin at 9:15 AM and 1:15 PM. Students who arrive late are asked to check in at the office to pick up a late slip.

5. Supervision of Students

We have teachers and educational assistants on duty in the playground at the following times:

- 8:45 AM to 8:50 AM
- · during recesses
- 12:45 PM to 12:55 PM

FOR THE SAKE OF CHILDREN'S SAFETY, PLEASE ENSURE THAT THEY DO **NOT** ARRIVE AT SCHOOL BEFORE SUPERVISION BEGINS.

School Safety Patrols are on duty at the following times:

- 8:40 AM to 8:55 AM
- 12:00 noon to 12:10 PM
- 12:40 PM to 12:55 PM
- 3:30 PM to 3:40 PM

Please help to ensure that your children travel to and from school only during times when patrols are on duty. Also, students must use the sidewalks and cross at the corners where patrols are on duty unless accompanied by their parent. Students should not use the back lanes.

<u>PATROLS AND EXTREME WIND-CHILL</u>: ON DAYS WHERE THE OUTSIDE TEMPERATURE WITH WINDCHILL REACHES MINUS 35 OR GREATER, PATROLS WILL <u>NOT</u> BE ON DUTY.

This threshold is based on the cold weather guidelines provided by the Winnipeg School Division and information on windchill available from Environment Canada. Windchill information in available to the public from a number of sources including the radio, television and the internet. We always use Environment Canada at The Forks information as our source for making decisions about indoor recess, etc.

6. Transportation for Nursery and Kindergarten Students

In the interest of safety only a parent or designated responsible adult is always to accompany Nursery and Kindergarten students to and from school each day.

7. Students Leaving School Early

Whenever students need to leave school early, such as for a medical appointment, we ask that the student be picked up by the parent (or another responsible adult). In an emergency, we can send students home accompanied by two school patrols. We would like to minimize this practice since it interrupts the school day for the patrols.

8. Change of Address and/or Telephone Numbers:

Please notify the office immediately when changes occur.

9. Reporting

Report cards go home in November, March and June. In addition, parent-teacher conferences are scheduled in November and March. If you would like information on your child's progress at other times during the year, please contact the classroom teacher.

10. Recess

All children in grades 1 to 6 are expected to go outside for a 15 minute recess both morning and afternoon. Students who are well enough to come to school are usually well enough to have an outdoor recess break.

Recess periods are as follows:

morning recesses: 10:35 AM to 10:50 AM afternoon recesses: 2:15 PM to 2:30 PM

Recess is indoors if it's raining or if the windchill is –28 or colder. When the windchill is between -25 to -27, we may have a shorter recess or allow students to come inside to warm up. There are times when the windchill recorded at The Forks is reported to be high but local conditions are milder because of the shelter provided by buildings and trees. Please help to see that the students are dressed appropriately for the weather.

11. Cell Phones, Cameras and Personal Electronics

Cell phones, cameras and personal electronics are not allowed at school. However, if a parent/guardian finds it necessary for their child to bring a cell phone to school for <u>safety reasons</u>, not social reasons, then the parent/guardian needs to contact Mr. Fox to discuss the matter.

12. Playground

Playground equipment is provided by the school. We request that students do not bring equipment from home, including skateboards, hockey sticks, bikes and baseball bats. Students can bring a ball for recess use as long as they are willing to share. If a ball goes over the playground fence, the student must check with the teacher or educational assistant before going to retrieve it. We have a 'No Wheels' policy at the school, which means students should not bring bikes, roller blades, skate boards, roller skate shoes (Heeleys), etc. to the school during school hours.

13. Behaviour of Students

Glenelm students are expected to behave in a safe and respectful manner and to do their best to learn. If necessary, we will request your help on behaviour issues.

In the event of damage to property, the person responsible will be asked to make restitution.

The Winnipeg School Division has adopted a Code of Behaviour which is endorsed by Glenelm School staff and the Glenelm School Parent Advisory Council.

14. Snack Food

The school has a "no junk food" policy including gum, seeds, soft drinks and candy. There may be times during the year when a class has a small party and an exception is made to this policy. We ask for your support in sending only nutritious snacks with the students. We also need everyone's help to keep the playground litter-free by using the garbage bins provided on the playground.

15. Show and Tell

Many of the primary classes have a designated day for students to bring a toy to school or other personal article (no pets please). The students know in advance when it is their turn for Show and Tell. Except for Show and Tell, we ask that students not bring toys or other personal articles to school.

16. Glenelm School Parent Advisory Council

All parents who send their children to Glenelm are welcome to participate in the Parent Council. A meeting is usually held once a month and you can attend regularly or as often as your schedule allows.

The Parent Council supports the education of students at Glenelm. We often have informal discussions about various issues facing the school. Some of the significant accomplishments of the Parent Council include raising money to support the purchase of SMART Boards, enhancing the music program, the library and play structure.

Each year an executive is chosen at the Open House in September. Details about the evening are sent home with students in September. If you know someone who might be interested in being an executive member or working on a committee, please encourage them to get involved. Remember, the Parent Council is made up of <u>all Glenelm parents</u>.

17. In-services

All schools are allowed ten days when the whole school is closed for in-services or administration purposes. Occasionally individual classrooms may be closed to allow those teachers to attend a workshop. We'll give you advance notice as soon as possible to allow you to make child care arrangements.

18. Assemblies

Each classroom hosts an assembly once a year. Assemblies are normally held monthly in the gym. Parents and community members are always welcome to attend.

19. Nurse

The nurse assigned to the school is Karla Gardner (204-223-1737). Karla serves the Glenelm Neighbourhood and Glenelm School on an oncall basis. Children who are between 4 and 6 years old need a booster immunization for diphtheria, pertussis and tetanus as well as a second dose of measles, mumps, and rubella vaccine. These immunizations will be offered within the school year for those children have not had them done by their doctor. The grade 6 students will be offered the HPV Immunization and the Hepatitis B vaccine.

Some of the services provided by the nurse are: health education, routine vision and hearing screening, health appraisals, and immunizations.

20. Student Medication

Parents who wish the school to administer medication must first have their doctor complete forms to support the request. These forms are available from the school office. All medication must be properly labelled and given to the office for safekeeping.

21. Student Accident Insurance

You will be receiving information regarding student accident insurance. The insurance is a good value and covers some potentially expensive situations for a very reasonable cost. It covers the student 24 hours per day/365 days per year and covers accidents whether at school or outside school hours. Please have a careful look at this information when it arrives at your home.

22. Lunch Program

The Lunch Program is operated by the Glenelm School Parent Advisory Council. The Council employs two adults to manage the program. Both can be contacted through the school office at 204-667-8534. The Lunch Program is located at Gordon King Memorial United Church, 127 Cobourg. Information about the lunch program is available from the school office.

23. Religious Exercises

Section 84(8) Public Schools Act "If a petition asking for religious exercises, signed by the parents or guardians of 75% of the pupils in the case of a school having fewer than 80 pupils or by the parents or guardians of at least 60 pupils in the case of a school having an enrolment of 80 or more pupils, is presented to the school board, religious exercises shall be conducted for the children of those parents or guardians in that school year."

Some of the guidelines for religious exercises are as follows:

- 1. The content of any religious exercise must be defined by the parents/guardians requesting such exercises. Parents of a variety of religious groups can petition to their own religious exercises (i.e., Buddhist, Jewish, Christian or other). Parents making the petition must provide whatever materials are essential for conducting these exercises.
- 2. Members of the parents' group petitioning for the exercises may make arrangements for volunteers to conduct the activity themselves.
- 3. Religious exercises are to be held outside regular instructional time, usually before school starts in the morning.
- 4. The complete guidelines are available by contacting Mr. Fox at the school.

24. Halloween Costumes

To help discourage violence and ensure the safest and best educational environment for your children we ask that you avoid sending your child to school in a Halloween costume which portrays the killing or hurting of someone else.

Weapons or items depicting weapons (swords, guns, knives, etc.) which may be part of a costume, should be left at home. Please support our attempt to discourage violence.

25. Lost and Found

Each year many articles find their way to the lost and found bin. To help reduce losses we suggest that all students' articles be labelled, especially all gym wear, outdoor clothing and boots. Lost items can be found in the lost and found box located in the link entrance. Small items such as rings, keys, etc. are kept in the office. In December and June unclaimed Lost and Found articles are donated to charity.

26. Child Care

Can You Imagine School Age Care & Education Centre Inc. is a licensed before and after school program that operates in the gymnasium of Glenelm School on school days from 7:00 AM to school start and from 3:30 to 6:00 PM. For those interested in this program please call Tracy at 204-668-4822 or stop by the school office to pick up the registration information.

Also, if you are interested in providing child care in your home part-time, full-time, before school, at lunch, after school and/or inservice days please call the school office at 204-667-8534 so this information can be made available for parents who enquire.

27. NSF Cheques

Due to the expense and staff time needed to process NSF cheques, we have instituted a charge, consistent with Parent Council practice. We will require a payment to cover our costs associated with NSF cheques.
