SUMMARY OF DISCUSSIONS – Wednesday, May 4, 2016

1. APPROVAL OF AGENDA

As there were seven voting representatives in attendance and eight are required to form a quorum, the parent representatives agreed to proceed with an informal meeting.

2. SAFE AND CARING POLICY – TRANS AND GENDER DIVERSE STUDENTS AND STAFF

Committee members received a video presentation on the Safe and Caring Policy – Trans and Gender Diverse Students and Staff. Your Committee was informed that the Winnipeg School Division strives for students to receive a high quality education in a safe, equitable and inclusive school environment. The Division is committed to providing learning opportunities, dignity, respect and equity for all. Your Committee was informed that the Safe and Caring Policy – Trans and Gender Diverse Students and Staff is intended to support all students and employees. The policy compliments existing provincial legislation, including the Public School Act and the Safe Schools Charter. In addition the policy strives to encourage the positive mental health among trans and gender creative students within the Winnipeg School Division and staff.

Your Committee was informed that the draft policy includes a comprehensive list of definitions and terms. All employees, students, volunteers and trustees are responsible for ensuring their conduct contributes to a welcoming, caring, respectful and safe learning and working environment for everyone. The specific responsibilities outlined in the draft policy will ensure effective and respectful support for individual needs.

Your Committee was informed that the Winnipeg School Division Code of Conduct is a key supporting document for the policy and essentially requires everyone to respect the rights of all students and staff with regard to their gender identity and gender expression, and be aware of unacceptable behaviours, such as bullying, harassment, violence or discrimination. Your Committee was informed that the policy also includes guidelines for dealing with conflict.

Your Committee was informed that students' and staff safety is the highest priority for the Winnipeg School Division.

Your Committee was informed that there are eight guiding principles for administering the policy consistently within all schools across the Winnipeg School Division.

- Direction on how to maintain student records for Trans and Gender Diverse students;
- Communication with parents or guardians;
- The right of students and employees to be addressed by their preferred name and pronoun;
- How to minimize gender segregated sorting – whether it is educational, recreational or competitive;
- Access to all-gender washrooms and appropriate change rooms; the use of an all gender washroom is a matter of choice and not mandatory;
- Arrangements for overnight trips, excursions and camps to provide accommodations that best address the needs of the students;
- Access to activities and sports regardless of sexual orientation, gender identity or expression;
- And school dress codes that ensure students have the right to dress in a manner consistent with their gender identity or expression.

Committee members were informed that many aspects of the Safe and Caring Policy is covered through the Division's Code of Conduct and the policy has many supports on procedures which staff can follow to effectively and consistently manage situations.

In response to an enquiry, Committee members were informed that in 2013, the Division embarked on a multi-year renovation program to provide gender inclusive washrooms in all facilities. The first phase of the program has been completed with gender inclusive washroom facilities in all high schools. The second phase will focus on junior high facilities and the final phase will address the remaining Division facilities. Committee members were informed that in the meantime, all schools in the Division are able to provide access to a washroom for students or staff who are seeking a gender inclusive facility.

Committee members expressed concern that there may be risk of excluding groups from the policy and encouraged the Division to be diligent in reviewing and updating the policy as needed.

In response to an enquiry, Committee members were informed that school policies are reviewed on a regular basis to ensure the policy is current and in line with any changes in legislation as well as feedback provided by the school community.

Committee members were informed that the video to clarify the intent of the policy as well as a survey is posted on the Division's website www.wsd1.org. The deadline to receive feedback regarding the draft policy is May 20, 2016.

3. Spring Formal


- DMCI hosted an evening Spring Formal dance on Friday April 15th. This event was very special for our students because it was the first evening dance held at DMCI in at least 10 years.



Sargent Park School Central District Advisory Report

May 4, 2016

Current Enrolment: 877 students in grades N – 9

Academic Endeavours:

√ Two of our students earned a gold medal at the Skills Manitoba competition at Red River College in the area of 2D animation. They will go on to represent Manitoba in the National Skills Competition in Moncton, New Brunswick. They were the youngest and only grade 9 team to ever win this competition.

√ On April 13th, our students participated in Day of Pink, a National Anti-Bullying initiative. Students and staff discussed how we can all support this initiative. Many students at the school supported this by wearing pink on that day.

√ Junior high students also supported "Free the Children" by taking part in a global fundraising and awareness campaign called "Vow of Silence". This campaign challenged the students to go SILENT to raise awareness and funds for the 1 billion children around the world who do not have the right to free speech and are being oppressed. On that day, the participating students chose not to talk for the entire school day.

√ On April 4th, our grade four students prepare and presented awesome Heritage Fair projects to their families relating to Canada's and Manitoba's history. A number of them will be presenting their outstanding projects at the University of Winnipeg on May 5th.

√ Earth week also took place in April and our students participated in many activities that thought them how they can make a difference to their planet. This initiative included daily announcements about environmental themes such as alternative energy sources and conservation, water conservation, plastic water bottles and battery recycling.

√ Our student Peace Group took on the challenge of collecting batteries for the Call2Recycle organization. Not only does the collection prevent batteries from entering the landfill, the heavy metals they contain are recycled. To date we have collected 70 kg of batteries.

√ We will be presenting our Musical 'Beauty and the Beast Jr.' on May 10th and 12th at 1:30 And 6:30 p.m. the performers have been working feverishly to prepare for this event.

√ On May 24th, our students will be hosting a 'Celebration of the Arts'. The celebration will focus on the performing and visual arts. Performing that evening will be the Junior High Band, Grade 6 and 7-9 Choirs, and the Grade 6 Dance Club. We will also have a gallery that will feature work from our visual arts, graphic arts, photograph and our clothing and design work.

ESD Initiatives:

√ Our school took part in *Bag Up Manitoba* and collected many plastic bags, to help keep these bags out of our landfills.

√ Our outdoor classroom is about to be construction. We have a multiphase plan that will include areas for students to experiment with nature and learn about their natural environment. The area will be built in four phases: Phase 1: teaching/sharing area for group meetings; Phase 2: Presenting/Working Area; Phase 3: Reflective Area for small group work; Phase 4 Grassy Play area.

√ We have taken on many initiative throughout the year to raise money to support those in need. We have raised money to support Winnipeg Harvest, Terry Fox Foundation, Siloam Mission, Ronald McDonald House and the Heart & Stroke Foundation.

Sports:

√ Sargent Park students had a very successful year in all our sports with many first place teams both at the Division level and the City level.

Parent Teacher Association:

√ The Sargent Park Parent Council held their Peak of the Market Fundraiser pre-selling vegetables, supporting local farmers in Manitoba. This healthy fundraiser was a success, and provided an opportunity for supporters to buy something that they use every day.

√ Hotdog lunches have occurred throughout the school year.

√ The Association is working closely with the school to pursue funds to support our school endeavors.

Tec-Voc High School held its annual **Open House** on Thursday, March 3. It was a very dynamic evening with many interested parents and students in attendance. Students from partner schools visited Tec during the week to get a feel for the place and assist them in making their high school decision. Students and staff visited a variety of schools during February to spread the Hornets message. The reception to our visits to feeder schools, tours and Open House was very positive. Initial indications are that many students and parents are choosing Tec-Voc as their high school. The 2015-2016 applications process is in full swing. Current students are completing their applications online.

Tec-Voc basketball teams had a great season and enjoyed the playoff run. The Varsity Girls dominated their games to capture the Winnipeg West Tier Two championship. The Junior Varsity girls had a great season ending with a victory in the bronze metal game after a close loss in the semi-final game. The Varsity Boys dramatically lost their quarter-final game. Today, March 19 the varsity boys had a great game at the lunch hour against a team from Winnipeg Police Service. Many fans in the stands for all teams.

The annual ski and snowboard trip to Assessippi was unique in that everyone escaped without a broken bone and enjoyed t-shirt skiing in the mild weather.

Tec-Voc celebrated the Festival de Voyageur on Thursday, February 19 during the noon hour on the school grounds and in the HornetDome. Activities include an Ice Carving demonstration, Slooshing, a Voyageur Photo Booth, Music and Entertainment and of course food.

The school will be closed for professional development on April 22 and May 9.

Graduating students will have their annual assembly on April 26.

Teacher candidates from the University of Manitoba, University of Winnipeg and Red River College will be in the school developing their practice over the next several months.

Many Tec-Voc students participated in the Waterloo Mathematics contest on February 24 with some outstanding results.

The first semester at Tec-Voc High School for the 2015-2016 school year ended on January 29. The second set of report cards was distributed to students on February 24. Parent conferences took place on March 17. The application process for 2015-2016 was a part of these conferences.
