SUMMARY OF DISCUSSIONS – Wednesday, February 16, 2017

1. APPROVAL OF AGENDA

The Committee members approved the Agenda of February 16, 2017.

2. 2017/2018 DRAFT BUDGET DISCUSSION

Committee members were provided with an overview of the 2017/2018 Draft Budget. Committee members were informed that Provincial funding for the Winnipeg School Division for 2017/2018 increased by \$2.6 million, or 1.4%, over the 2016/2017 Budget.

Committee members were informed that 2017/2018 provincial funding provides 62% of total revenue while 36% comes from property taxation and 2% from other sources. The total revenue from the Province is projected to be \$245,622,498.

Committee members were informed that the Board developed the budget based on the Winnipeg School Division's Strategic Plan. The plan includes providing robust and comprehensive education, equitable access, diverse opportunity and a supportive learning environment for all students. It includes retaining, attracting and developing valued staff, addressing barriers to learning, enhancing sustainable development initiatives and developing communications and partnerships with the community.

Committee members reviewed the expenditures required in the draft budget for the 2017/2018 school year. Committee members were informed that 81% of the draft budget goes directly to the cost of providing instruction and supports in the classroom. The other 19% covers costs such as student transportation, building maintenance and operations, business administration and support services related to research, planning and technology. Other mandatory expenses are Canada Pension Plan costs, Employment Insurance premiums, payroll tax and the cost of supplies, materials, books and equipment.

Committee members were informed that in order to achieve a balanced budget, the Board of Trustees have proposed three options for a school levy tax increase: A 3% increase would be equal to an annual increase of \$40, a 3.9% increase equals to a \$52 and a 4.5% increase equals to a \$60 increase on an average assessed value of a home in the Division.

Committee members were informed that the Education Property Tax Credit is currently \$700 per owner occupied home. Seniors are eligible for an additional credit and renters are also eligible for a credit through their income tax, however, this credit is under review by the current government.

Committee members were informed that in order to achieve a 3% special levy tax, Adult Crossing Guards, the Nursery Program, Library Technical Assistants, changes to the Transportation Policy and mileage expense payments would have to be significantly reduced to achieve savings.

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Committee members discussed the proposed changes to the Division's Transportation Policy which includes fee for service and special circumstances. Committee members were informed that parents would no longer have that option to pay a fee of service for students who do not meet the mandated distance requirements. Committee members were informed that this would also include students being bussed to language programs.

Committee members expressed concerns that a reduction to the nursery program would not be beneficial to early child learning and would also cause concern due to shortage of available daycare spaces. Committee members supported the phasing out of full day kindergarten program so the nursery program could continue to be offered to students.

Committee members were informed that the full day kindergarten pilot project will be completed once the child enters grade 3, at which time an analysis of the program results will be provided to the Board for review.

Committee members supported the School Resource Officers in schools as student safety is deemed a priority. The SRO's provide support to students in crisis and have assisted in adverting a potential crisis situation. The SRO's build solid relationships with the indigenous community and provide students, parents and community members with a sense of support and security. The SRO program is valued a great deal in schools.

Committee members also supported the adult crossing guards in schools due to safety risks. Committee members are in support of maintaining the adult crossing guard program.

Committee members were informed the Division provides many other programs and services that are not funded by the province such as the breakfast, milk program, and nutrition programs.

Committee members also discussed programming additions such as autism early intervention team and autism assistive technology. The Committee was informed that the autism early intervention team includes gathering a team of specialists to support and improve services to students, teachers and families. Committee members were also informed that autism assistive technology would provide schools with assistive technology to communicate effectively with students with autism.

Committee members discussed the International Student Program. Committee members were informed that although there would be a significant startup cost associated with International Student program the program would see profits in the second or third years into the program. Committee members were informed programming would be hosted in schools that had vacant space available. The international students enrolled in the program would pay a tuition fee. Members of the community will provide lodging for the students enrolled in the international student program.

Committee members were informed that other educational improvements pending consideration include solar program, reduce energy costs and upgrading technology.

Committee members expressed concern that the Budget Information Brochure and survey did not provide enough detail to make an informed decision. Committee members were informed that the District Advisory Committee meetings were dedicated to present proposed draft budget details and provide as much feedback to questions and concerns as possible. Committee members were informed that the budget simulation tool on the WSD website is a good resource as it provides a brief summary of what is affected when the funding to a service is raised or lowered.

Committee members were informed that in addition to budget presentations at District Advisory Committee meetings, information is available on the Division's website. A Public meeting will also be held on February 27, 2017 at Administration Building No. 1, 1577 Wall Street East at 7:00 p.m. to provide budget information to the general public and receive feedback from individuals or groups that may wish to attend as well there is a survey posted on the Division's website <u>www.winnipegsd.org</u>. The deadline to receive feedback regarding the budget will be received by the Board until March 6, 2017. All feedback will be considered by the Finance/Personnel Committee. The Board of Trustees will approve the budget at its meeting to be held March 13, 2017.

February 28 is Children of the Earth's Career Fair

February 23 is our **Open House** for the community to see what Children of the Earth has to offer with our unique programming. 4:00-6:00 pm

COTE is happy to continue their partnership with the University of Manitoba's Faculty of Kinesiology who deliver the "Rec & Read" Aboriginal mentor program which builds on the strengths, talents, and energy of Aboriginal youth. Offered as an after school program, Rec and Read provides a supportive, holistic approach to children and youth, physical activity, nutrition and education programming. While designed by and with Aboriginal youth, this program has applications for all young people living in diverse communities. Our students have been working with the Niji Mahkwa students since February 9 and will continue until Spring Break.

Our Diversity/GSA group is looking forward to the first ever WSD OUT forum for students who identify as an ally for promoting equality and diversity being held at RB Russell on February 21st.

Grade 12 students joined our Career Intern to visit local Universities to explore programs and post-secondary options.

Students participated in several exciting attendance incentive initiatives including: "Be here to Eat", "Be present to win a present", "CHairmiles: Passport to Rewards" and "Roll Out of Bed to Win!"

Walking the Red River Path- Grade 12 students went to Red River Community College to explore what Red River has to offer.

February 8 "Everybody has the Right" Grade 10 Medical Career students went to Thunderbird House to attend the Living Library where they heard from Indigenous Human books.

Month of February – Pipe ceremonies were Eagle Teachings of Love.

Sarasvati Productions Theatre's Afterschool program joined us in February. Students enjoy another after school opportunity to take part in drama exercises.

Students joined Niji Mahkwa to see Frontier Fiddlers and Manitoba Chamber Orchestra perform at Westminster United Church.



Language development PD with clan teachings for staff was done in February.

Semester 1 is complete and Semester 2 is now underway.

January Pipe Ceremonies included Buffalo teachings of Respect.

Mayor Brian Bowman collaborated with students on January 19 and had a wonderful discussion about reconciliation. The power went out, but the conversation continued! Was enjoyed by all.

Grade 9 Visual Arts students designed and painted a feather representing community to adorn the first Indigenous themed float included in Winnipeg's 2016 Santa Clause Parade.

Girls Drum Group - Ikwewag Ga-zoongiga Niiwawiiwad (Women Standing Strong) practices at lunch hours 3-4 times a week. – The group also sings for guests and at pipe ceremonies within the school and division.

Basketball is running for boys and girls and badminton is being offered after school.

December 21 was our Winter Feast and Fun Day event. Santa was here and pictures were taken!

AbOriginal Student Co-op started on October 11th and is offered twice a week. The student run Co-Op is a partnership with COTE, SEED (Supporting Employment and Economic Development), and the Manitoba Cooperative Association. The curriculum teaches the basics of cooperative enterprises including business and cooperative principals. Hard and soft skills necessary to run a business including, inventory management, production, accounting, marketing, cashier and customer service, teamwork, decision making, public speaking sales, money managements. Curriculum is designed through an indigenous lens to connect cooperative business principles and practices to indigenous traditional knowledge and principals. December 4 Art sale at Assiniboine Park Conservatory was a success.

November 10-We watched the **play Shattered put on by Sarasviti** Productions. This play dealt with Mental Health- depression and anxiety. At the end audience participation allowed actors to end with a positive spin by changing the end of the stories.

The **Girls' Volleyball season** wrapped up on November 8th. 10 girls improved their skills while displaying great sportsmanship, teamwork and school pride during the season. The Thunderbirds were competitive and these players enjoyed their season in the Winnipeg School Division League.

November 9th Remembrance Day Ceremony and pipe ceremony. Students heard from Veterans and remembered why peace is so important.

The **COTE GSA** started up again on November 9th. Our Gay/Straight Alliance welcomes ALL especially those who want Children of the Earth to continue to be a school environment that is inclusive, safe and accepting. This student lead group will be running a Spirit week, Anti Bully Day and other awareness days pertaining to creating an inclusive environment

Inspiration Based Music Program. Our weekly after-school program, available to all students and family, started on October 5th. Participants participate in artistic collaborations and musical expression through



playing instruments, singing and song writing. Participants are encouraged to learn individually, write and jam collectively, attempt new instruments (trying all available options before settling on just one) and provide peer led instruction as students teach each other to replicate what they've learned on a particular instrument. This program is run in partnership with the Manitoba Conservatory of Music and Arts and the Winnipeg Foundation.

On October 21st we held a Safe Food Handlers course at the school.

Journey and Succeed Program Started on October 12th. This after school program runs weekly and focuses on financial & employment literacy skills, through a partnership with Centre for Aboriginal Human Resource Development. Students participate in educational sessions, volunteering and training. We also partner with SEED Winnipeg and Assiniboine Credit Union to help ours students obtain birth certificates, Social Insurance Numbers and open bank accounts.

Meet the Staff was on October 4th and was well attended

COTE hosted a Family Portrait Day on Saturday October 1st in partnership with Tec Voc. Working with professional photographers and Tec Voc students we offered USB drives to families loaded with Portraits of their families. Participating schools included David Livingstone and Dufferin

Career Trek presented at our *Baby and Me Program*, on September 27th. This program designed to provide our young parents (students) with skills and resources to support healthy early year's child development.

In September our school recognized Orange Shirt Day! Every Child Matters

September 14th our school had our Fall Feast, Pipe Ceremony, Sage Picking and Teaching at Birds Hill Park.

School Report

Dear Students, Staff, Parents and Community Members

The stretch of time from January to March of each school year is our longest uninterrupted learning time. Keeping this in mind, our school has been very mindful to protect student learning time and focus on helping all our students grow and develop. Students and staff are building on the learning relationships that have been established from September to December. Part of this learning for our students and staff has been the decision to offer our students mid year exams. This decision came out of feedback from quite a number of our parents and grade 7 students from our last school year. They expressed that a year end exam that covers the range of learning from September to early June was simply overwhelming for our students, especially grade 7 students who are writing exams for the first time. Based on this feedback as well as consultations with staff, the rationale to have mid year exams is to provide our students with the experience in writing exams and divide the content covered by the exams.

We are also now in into our fourth year of working on strengthening our students understanding of math essentials as students continue to work on developing their knowledge of essential math skills and concepts. Students continue to work on their efficiency with the math drills done in the classrooms. The teachers are currently working on a project that will support aligning the curriculum taught within each of the teams, helping them to better meet the needs of all our learners. In the area of literacy, our ELA teachers have been able to assess our students' literacy levels with the Scholastic Reading Inventory (SRI) and Fountas and Pinnell. The information they are continually gathering will guide them in the instruction of reading and comprehension. ELA teachers are meeting regularly and are working on implementing common assessments in the area of writing. Based on the Elementary Assessment Procedures, students will be submitting pieces of writing and assessed using a writing continuum. These assessments will be shared with parents during our March Student Led Conferences.

On the athletics court, our junior and senior boys' and girls' basketball teams are well into the swing of competition and practices. The gym is busy everyday with the sound of students running, passing, scoring and enjoying the team building and learning. Our students are participating with enthusiasm in the Inner City Soccer League as well and everyone enjoyed the Jamboree that was held at the Seven Oaks soccer complex on February 9th. A big thank you is extended to all our coaches, organizers and supervisors for their time and energy in working with our students. Special thank you are also in order for Ms. MacKenzie for her lead on basketball and Mr. Dyer for his tireless work with soccer.

Looking ahead we will be quite busy preparing our grade nine students to visit Gordon Bell, Daniel McIntyre, Tec Voc High, Children of the Earth and R.B. Russell at the end of February and into early March. We will also be hosting visits from our elementary sending schools - Victoria Albert, Dufferin, Pinkham, Sister MacNamara and Wellington Schools in March. It is worth noting that regardless of your grades, it's important for parents/caregivers and students to have the necessary information and knowledge to make informed learning choices and to send your applications to the schools as early as possible to ensure that students receive their requested course selections.

We also invite you to consider attending our Peaceful Village's Parent Gathering on February 28th from 5 to 7 p.m. At this time, there will be a presentation on Health Care Services as well as a budget time consultation regarding our Winnipeg School Division budget for 2017-2018.
