SUMMARY OF DISCUSSIONS - Tuesday, February 16, 2021

1. APPROVAL OF AGENDA

The Committee members approved the Agenda of February 16, 2021, as distributed.

2. 2021/2022 Draft Budget Discussion

The Secretary-Treasurer was in attendance to provide an overview on the draft Budget for the 2021/2022 school year.

Committee members were informed that on February 4, 2021, the Province of Manitoba announced an increase in education funding of \$20.8 million dollars. This resulted in a decrease in funding from the province of 1.6% or \$2.9 million dollars and an additional reduction from other revenue resources such as the Federal government of \$1.3 million dollars. As a result, the Board of Trustees is required to reduce almost \$5 million in programs in order to achieve a balanced budget of \$421,039,405. As directed by the Provincial Government, the property tax levy for WSD home and business owners will be frozen at 2020 levels or a decrease of about \$6 a year on the average assessed home value of \$225,700 within in WSD.

Committee members were informed that the reduction in the provincial budget along with the two percent cap on the special levy has created a deficit that requires WSD to reduce programs and/or services in order to achieve a balanced budget for the 2021/2022 school year.

Committee members were informed that the Board of Trustees drafted a proposed list of reductions to be made including School Resource Officers, Unfilled divisional support position vacancies, Occupational/ Physiotherapy, Milk Subsidy Program, Utility savings, School Budgets (non-salary), and School Clerk positions(12 month to 10 month).

In response to an enquiry, Committee members were informed that a list of non-mandated programs is available under Financial Facts on the WSD website.

Committee members discussed each item and expressed concern regarding the proposed reduction to Occupational/ Physiotherapy programming. The Secretary-Treasurer informed Committee members that the Board discussed the possibility of the program being subsidized by Health Services. The Board of Trustees will request a meeting with the province to request that funding be provided by the WRHA for the delivery of the program.

In a response to an enquiry, Committee members were informed that in the event that WRHA is unable to subsidize the costs of the Occupational/ Physiotherapy program the Board of Trustees would need to re-examine the list of non-mandated programs to determine in what other areas reductions could be made to balance the budget.

A Community Support Worker informed Committee members that the Occupational/ Physiotherapy program is more effective when the Occupational/ Physiotherapists are able to observe students in their school environments. As an example, Occupational Therapists are trained to observe students writing and recognize that a small devise on their pencil could provide much needed support in developing their writing skills. The Community Support Worker expressed that it is less effective when the students have to leave the school environment to access these resources.

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A parent representative expressed concern that access to these programs outside of the school environment is very costly and for many families this is a vital resource which would no longer be available to their children if it is not offered in the school.

A parent representative suggested that a partnership to deliver Occupational/ Physiotherapy programs to students similar to student teachers might be beneficial. Committee members were informed that WSD can explore that option. Committee members also recommended that the Board and the administration consider other options to retain the Occupational/ Physiotherapy program in the event that Health Services is unable to subsidize the program.

In response to an enquiry regarding the SRO program, the Secretary-Treasurer informed Committee members that initially the SRO program began as a tripartite agreement between the City of Winnipeg, the Province of Manitoba and WSD, for the delivery of service and was equally funded by all parties. In recent years, the province does not provide funding to support for any increases and WSD has supplemented the difference to support the continuation of the program. The Board of Trustees will continue discussions with the City and Province regarding alternate options for the SRO program.

In response to an enquiry regarding the proposed school budget reductions, the Secretary-Treasurer informed Committee members that this does not include supports in technology for laptops, iPad's etc. as technology has increased to support remote learning due to Covid-19 pandemic.

Trustee Chen informed Committee members that the Board of Trustees will be hosting a Special meeting on February 22nd to receive feedback from delegations regarding the 2021/2022 Budget. Anyone wishing to provide a delegation would need to register with the Board Office prior to February 18, 2021 at noon, and that any feedback in writing should be submitted no later than March 1, 2021. All feedback will be taken into consideration by the Board of Trustees prior to finalizing the Budget. The Budget must be submitted to the Province of Manitoba by March 15, 2021.

3. NEW BUSINESS

3.1 Cecil Rhodes School

Committee members requested an update on the renaming of Cecil Rhodes School.

The administration informed Committee members that the surveys have been completed and that the administration is reviewing the results of the survey. Committee members were informed that WSD received a good response to the survey. The results of the survey will be presented to the Board of Trustees at a future meeting for review and consideration.

Wellness Wednesdays

Wellness Wednesdays with Anna-Maria (Guidance Counsellor) takes place every other Wednesday over the lunch hour on Google classroom. Through virtual meetings, students are invited to learn about opportunities for counselling and other resources available within the community that students can access. Topics include stress, anxiety and personal well-being. Resources are shared with students such as, Nor'West Youth Hub and how they can access this resource. The promotion of positive mental health strategies, encouraging access to programs and resources available within the community.

Mv Blue Print-

School wide launch of My Blue Print where students can prepare for school to work/post-secondary. Students are also required to complete their resumes and cover letters on My Blue Print along with the surveys to explore possible careers and potential post-secondary options. Students are also required to complete a mock interview with Kathy and Mary.

Virtual Parent Gatherings via Microsoft Teams

<u>Virtual Parent Yoga Sessions - Integrating quadrants of the Medicine Wheel</u>

Early evening yoga practices monthly focusing on relaxation techniques, the importance of self-care, and the teachings of each specific quadrant of the Medicine Wheel.

<u>Youth in Philanthropy</u> – a likeminded group of five students in grades 10-12 who envision a safe, strong community where everyone from any culture and background can work together. Argyle's YiP committee received \$7,693.17 from The Winnipeg Foundation to distribute to charities of their choice this school year. Each committee member helps to decide which charities will receive grants, how much money each will receive, and how it will be spent. After a much needed and well-earned break over the winter holiday, we welcomed back our staff, parents, community members and students. They have returned with a great deal of enthusiasm and readiness for learning.

- Food donations have been organized by WSD and RB Russell School. This provided our school community with dozens of whole chickens to give away to families in need.
- Students in Grade 7 and Grade 8 were at home for Remote Learning from Jan 4-18/2021. Our students had practiced using the online learning platforms and processes with their teachers.
