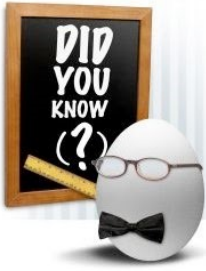

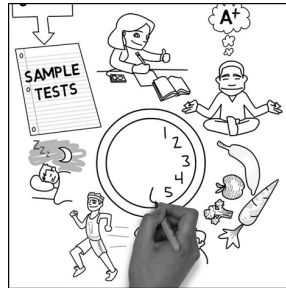

### Healthy Habits

Exam time can be extremely stressful. How do you handle your stress? Many people rely on junk food, caffeine, and pull all-nighters during exam time. However, it is especially important during this time to be mindful of healthy habits.

### Eat healthy foods:

Eat! However, make smart food choices. A greasy cheeseburger and fries might taste great at the time, but it can make you feel sluggish later. Choose nutritious foods such as fruits and vegetables.

### Careful on the caffeine:

While caffeine in coffee or cola can give a boost in the short term, too much can negatively affect your sleep and cause you to feel anxious. It may also affect your ability to focus. Remember to stay hydrated. Drink plenty of water.

The following Summer School and Upgrading Course options are available to students:

### *Winnipeg School Division Summer Session*

Summer Sessions offer a variety of grade 7 – 12 non - repeater and repeater courses, and are an excellent option for students. Students can attend sessions to get additional or missing course credits, or to improve their grade in completed courses. Classes are offered at both *Kelvin High School and Andrew Mynarski VC School.* *Classes begin July 3 — July 26 (Mon—Fri)*

### TWO WAYS TO REGISTER: IN PERSON OR ONLINE.

If you register and pay in person, payment may be cash, debit, personal cheque or money order (payable to the Winnipeg School Division, Summer Session). They are unable to process credit card transactions in person. **In person registration takes place in the Summer Session office at Ashland School, 170 Ashland Avenue in Room 2 Main Floor. Registration will be accepted if there are spots available in the class. Please check the Winnipeg School Division website first to see which courses are still available.**

To register on-line, go to <https://www.winnipegsd.ca/summer-session/Pages/default.aspx> you can register on-line with or without a PayPal account. You can use your credit card (Visa, MasterCard or American Express) without setting up a PayPal account.

Whether a class will run is dependent on registration numbers. The final decision regarding which courses are run will be made at the end of the day, Sunday July 1st. Courses will be cancelled with insufficient student registrations. **Please check the WSD website on Monday, July 2nd, for a current listing of courses being offered.**

If a class is cancelled at the school site you chose, you may take a different course at that same school site; stay in the same course but attend at the other site or receive a full refund.

### *University of Manitoba Upgrading Courses*

The University of Manitoba offers upgrading courses for students who do not meet their high school requirements or are missing prerequisite courses. The following courses are offered:

*Math Skills* provides students with the necessary background to continue with university level math and science coursework.

*Preparatory Chemistry (CHEM 0900) and/or Preparing for University Physics (PHYS 0900)* are offered to students who require a Grade 12 level chemistry or physics.

*BIOL 1000 – a non - laboratory introductory biology course* is offered to students who require a Grade 12 level biology.

## Kelvin students take part in world-wide

Approximately 60 Kelvin students took part in a civil demonstration calling for stronger action to address Climate Change at the Manitoba Legislature on March 15. They joined over a 100 Winnipeg students from elementary and high schools around the city. The demonstration was part of a global event taking place in more than 100 countries involving hundreds of thousands of



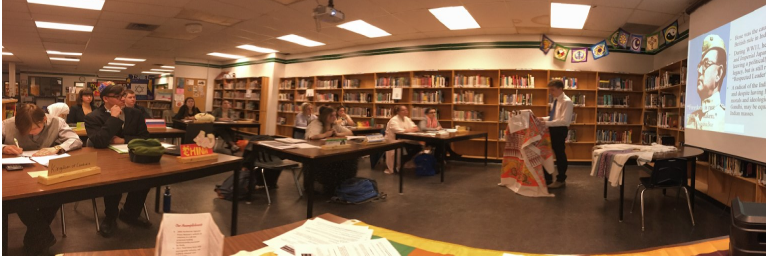
students, inspired by School Strike for Climate Change — a movement that Swedish 16-year-old Greta Thunberg began in August, 2018 with her slogan "our house (Mother Earth) is on fire". The event was a call to action as much as one against government. One of the giant messages carried by Kelvin students read: **"There is no PLANet B"**, in reference to the UN International Panel on Climate Change report that concluded humanity has



12 years left to avoid catastrophic warming of 1.5 Celsius. Speakers urged people to take their own small steps to collectively make a large difference, such as bringing reusable bags to grocery stores, reusing everything as much as possible, and walking, cycling or taking transit rather than driving. The event ended with a moment of silence for the Earth. Kelvin plans to send students to the next School Strike on May 24th. In the meantime, Kelvin is organizing initiatives in our school such as composting, felt markers and battery depots and encouraging students to reduce plastic. On May 13th, students listened to a presentation by Victor Selby, a former West K High School Environmental Member who took part in a National Waste Reduction project.



# Asia Pac Scholars Demonstrate Diplomacy and Debating Skills



Kelvin Intermediate and Senior scholars recently took part in a United Nations style role play conference which served as their examination for their studies in Asian politics, society, and sustainability. Students enrolled in this after

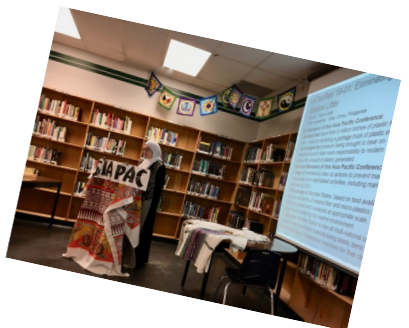
school credit course had been preparing for the day-long event since January, contacting the Asian embassies and non-governmental organizations that they had chosen to represent, researching their policies and honing their lobbying, speech-making and debating skills in preparation for the Conference, which



took place in Kelvin's Library during one extended school day. Grade 9 Asia Pacific scholars observed the debating action, and acted as judges for the posters created by their Intermediate and Senior colleagues. This year, the Asia-Pac Conference debated resolutions on *Plastic & Marine Waste, Updating Laws on Sexual Assault, Addressing Fake News Spread on Social Media, as well as on Reforming Human Trafficking and Drug Trafficking Laws.* One



highlight this year: the unanticipated interception of the first Press Conference of the day by Internet hacker Anonymous. Congratulations go out to all Asia Pacific Scholars for their successful completion of this Role Play, which has become a tradition of early spring at Kevin. For more information about the Asia Pacific Studies program, the only one of its kind in Manitoba

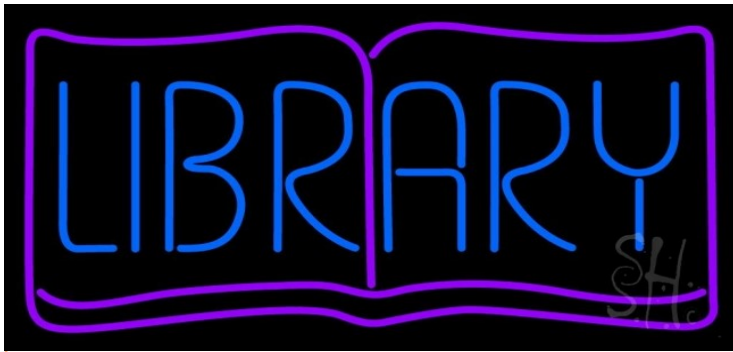

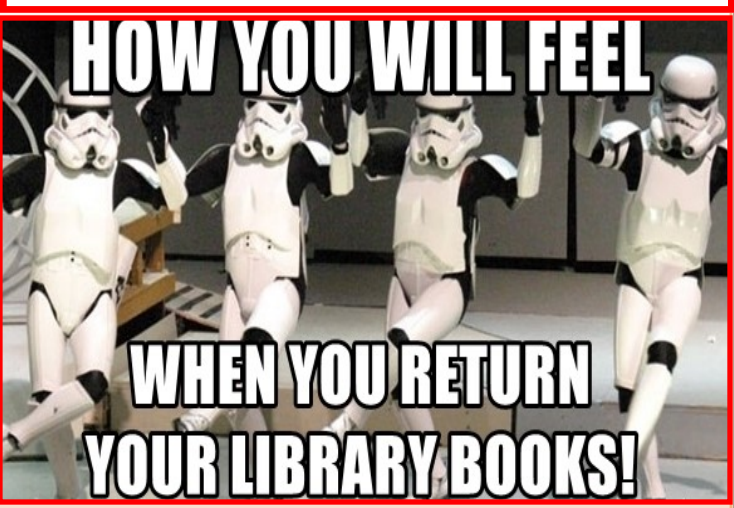

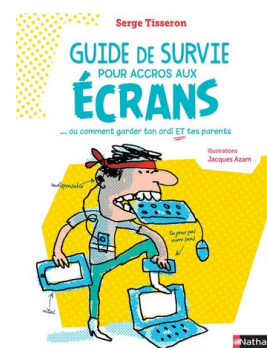


## Bienvenue à la bibliothèque !

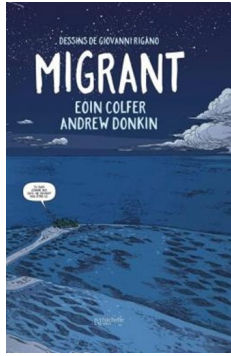

# SPRING FRENCH BOOK-REVIEWS

## La sélection de ce mois de Mai



L'espoir est fait d'actions. Voici quelques livres qui ne vous laisseront pas indifférents :

### **Migrant** d'Eoin Colfer et Andrew Donkin

« *La Méditerranée est devenue le plus grand cimetière du monde* » Olivier Clochard, géographe, codirecteur de Migrinter, laboratoire du CNRS à l'université de Poitiers.

*D'après un rapport de l'ONU, Le trafic des migrants a rapporté entre 5,5 et 7 milliards de dollars en 2016.*

Après sa sœur et son frère, c'est maintenant au tour d'Ebo de quitter son village natal, situé au cœur de l'Afrique, et de tenter sa chance vers une nouvelle vie en Europe. Et c'est ainsi que commence un long périple pour cet orphelin de 12 ans. Il y aura d'abord l'arrivée dans une grande ville aux abords du Sahara et les petits boulots pour payer la traversée du désert. Viendront ensuite les désillusions et la déshumanisation qui joncheront son parcours jusqu'à Tripoli, en Libye. La peur ne le quittera plus à présent et l'accompagnera sur son embarcation de fortune en Méditerranée...

Dès la première planche de cette bande dessinée, on est toute de suite plongé dans cette atmosphère d'insécurité en suivant Ebo et ses amis perdus en pleine mer. Le scénario alterne entre moments présents et retours en arrière, ce qui nous permet de mieux appréhender l'histoire et de suivre l'odyssée de ce jeune garçon. La grande force de cette œuvre fictionnelle est qu'elle relate des détails authentiques mis en relief par la virtuosité du dessinateur italien Giovanni Rigano. Beaucoup de questions naîtront de la lecture de cette tragédie humaine. Une première réponse qui s'impose est, comme le disait Elie Wiesel, qu'aucun être humain n'est « illégal ».

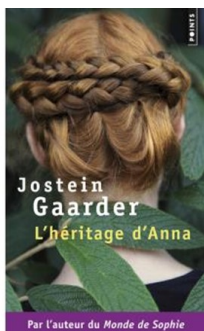
### **Le capitalisme expliqué à ma petite-fille (en espérant qu'elle en verra la fin)** de Jean Ziegler



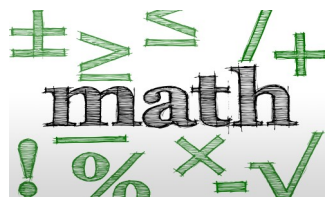
Extrait de la page 109 : « *...le pouvoir exercé par les oligarques du capital financier mondialisé est aujourd'hui le véritable gouvernement du monde et il fait obstacle au bonheur de la multitude. Tout être humain est donc investi à son égard du devoir d'insurrection.* »

En imaginant un dialogue avec sa petite fille, Zohra, Jean Ziegler nous explique l'origine et le fonctionnement de ce grand ogre cannibale qu'est le système capitaliste. L'auteur traverse le temps et les époques depuis l'Antiquité jusqu'à aujourd'hui. De manière brève mais éclairée, il interroge la notion de propriété privée et l'accumulation de capital par quelques privilégiés au détriment du bien commun. L'avidité et la toute puissance des sociétés transcontinentales privées leurs conférant tous les droits, elles gouvernent à présent le monde : abondance et consommation individuelle pour une minorité, misère et inégalités pour le plus grand nombre. Après la lecture de ce petit livre, on comprend mieux les causes sous-jacentes de l'endettement des pays du sud, de la faim dans le monde et de la destruction de notre environnement. On s'interroge sur notre complicité dans le fonctionnement de ce système. A-t-on si peu de contrôle dans notre vie ? Peut-être ou peut-être pas... L'auteur nous engage sur la voie du changement.

### **L'héritage d'Anna** de Jostein Gaarder



À la veille de ses 16 ans, Anna, une jeune norvégienne à l'imagination débordante, reçoit le « smartphone » de ses rêves et la mystérieuse bague de sa tante Sunniva. La même nuit elle rêve d'être projetée en 2082 dans un monde qu'elle ne reconnaît pas et où elle consulte constamment l'application LOST SPECIES qui dénombre d'heure en heure la disparition des espèces vivantes sur terre. Dans ce songe, Anna devient Nova, son arrière-petite-fille, et elle reçoit une deuxième chance pour sauver la planète à condition de tenir une promesse. Anna sait maintenant qu'elle doit écrire une lettre à sa descendante avant minuit et qu'elle doit participer au sursaut de l'humanité en inventant un nouveau futur. C'est une bien jolie fable qui nous est contée ici, avec, en toile de fond, un questionnement sur notre identité commune d'être humain et la nécessité d'agir pour assurer notre survie. C'est un livre dont on aimerait semer les idées au gré du vent.

# Kelvin wins national title in Ethics!

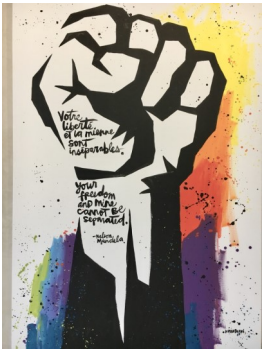


Kelvin scholars representing Manitoba at the Canadian High School



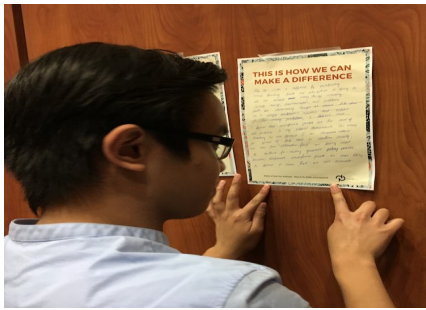
Ethics Bowl competition held at the Canadian Museum for Human Rights have recently been judged the *top student ethicists* in the country.

The students -- from grade 12: Nicholas L, Ethan B. and Nova M. and from Grade 11: Emily G., Marit S., Pearson M. -- spent three months researching and discussing complex ethical topics ranging from *treating Climate Change as a war effort* to *Indigenous Autonomy in the Child Welfare System*; from the *ethics of a Victim Impact Statements in criminal proceedings* to the roles of society, corporations and government in dealing with *Fake News*. Their preparation culminated in a series of 10 discussions with 'opposing' teams in which views were presented, critiqued, modified and integrated, with judges evaluating participants on their demonstration of **relevant knowledge, articulacy, respectful collaboration, originality, intellectual improvisation, and critical thinking**. Perhaps most impressive of all, participants shared their views and proposals without any notes or prepared speeches as per Ethics Bowls rules.

# Kelvin students "pitch" ideas at Mayor's "State of the City"



Eight Grade 12 students, Tian K., Emily G., Tiva K., Evan M., Gabriel M., Heather A., Cassidy K. and Tim O took part in a day-long workshop at the Convention Centre during which they collaborated with youth and community mentors to discuss their big ideas to improve Winnipeg and propose their suggestions to Mayor Brian Bowman. The event, sponsored by the Winnipeg Chamber of Commerce, attracted approximately 70 civic-minded scholars, most of whom came on

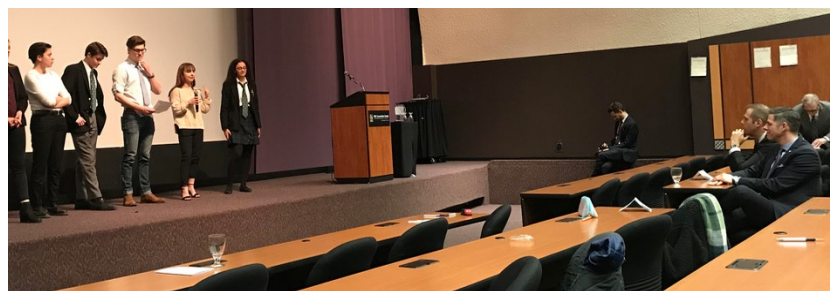

since the Winnipeg General Strike and the building of the Aqueduct. which, while bringing clean water to Winnipeg, displaced Shoal Lake 40 First Nation. Special thanks go out to Kelvin parent Ellen Kornelson of the WCC for facilitating Kelvin's participation in recent addresses by the Mayor and the Premier of Manitoba over the past few years.

Classes were invited to attend presentations throughout the day by several speakers specialising in aspects of the strike itself, personalities and photos from the day and life in the early 1900s in addition to a lunchtime talk by Wab Kinew, leader of the provincial NDP, who discussed the importance of labour rights and the connections between the modern NDP and the Winnipeg General Strike.

# SAFE GRAD 2019

In order to purchase tickets and attend the Safe Grad Dinner and Dance the following steps must be completed:

## STEP 1 - VERIFICATION

All Grads must be **VERIFIED** by the Safe Grad Committee **BEFORE** they can purchase tickets.

Verification forms handed out in English classes. Once verified, each grad will receive a passcode that will allow them to purchase their tickets. Verification takes place on May 8h and 9th.

## STEP 2 - PURCHASE OF TICKETS

Students who have been **VERIFIED** can purchase their tickets for the Dinner, Dance, and Safe Grad 2019 in one of the following ways:

### i) ON-LINE GRAD TICKET PURCHASE

Students can purchase their tickets (maximum of 6) for the Dinner, Dance, and Safe Grad 2019 on-line, using a VISA or MasterCard credit card **ONLY**, from **Monday, May 13 to Sunday, May 26, 2019**. Students can find the link on Kelvin's website. Food allergies and/or vegetarian requests are to be Indicated on-line, as you register each guest.

### ii) IN-PERSON GRAD TICKET PURCHASE

Students can purchase their tickets in person from Ms. K. Stewart, in Room 25 during lunch (12:25-1:15) on **Tuesday, May 14 and Wednesday, May 15**. **After Wednesday, May 16, tickets can only be purchased online.**

## STEP 3 - TICKET PICK-UP

Students who purchase tickets **via either method** will be allowed to pick up their tickets on **Wednesday, June 12, 2019 from 4:00 - 6:00 pm** in the Library. Grads must bring their receipt verifying that they have paid for their tickets on-line or in person.

### IMPORTANT NOTES:

- **ONLY VERIFIED GRADUATES** will be allowed to purchase and pick up their tickets.
- You must bring your on-line receipt or in-person receipt when picking up tickets.
- If a grad is unable to pick up their tickets at this time, they may give their receipt to a trusted friend to pick up the tickets on their behalf.

## STEP 4 - THE BIG DAY— MONDAY, JUNE 24, 2019

Grads AND their dates need to bring photo ID and their Grad tickets to the Dinner, Dance and Safe Grad on June 24. If photo ID and/or grad tickets are missing, the Grad and/or guest will NOT be

allowed to enter the Safe Grad Dinner and Dance. **NO EXCEPTIONS.**

## STEP 5 - EXITING THE SAFE GRAD DINNER AND DANCE

Designated drivers who are picking up graduates and their dates/sponsored guests must be at least 21 years of age and hold a valid full stage driver's license. **Everyone attending Safe Grad is required to have pre-arranged for a designated driver and will not be permitted to drive home / take a cab from the Safe Grad event.**

The designated drivers, as identified on the verification forms, must present a valid driver's license to the Check-Out Committee in order to sign out their grad and his/her date/sponsored guest. **If the driver has no ID, the alternative driver listed on the verification forms will be contacted.**

### **WHEN AND WHERE IS THE GRADUATION REHEARSAL? HOW LONG IS IT? IS IT COMPULSORY TO ATTEND?**

The Rehearsal will be held on, Friday, June 21 at 11:00 am at Calvary Temple, 440 Hargrave Street. The rehearsal should not take more than 30 - 40 minutes. Attendance is expected.

### **WHEN AND WHERE IS THE CEREMONY?**

10:00 am, Wednesday, June 27 at Calvary Temple, 440 Hargrave Street.

### **WHAT TIME DOES THE CEREMONY START AND END? HOW LONG IS IT?**

The procession of Graduates will begin with their entrance into the Church Sanctuary between 9:45 and 9:50 pm. The Ceremony commences promptly at 10:00 am. The Ceremony is nearly three hours long – there are over 300 graduates.

### **WHERE DO STUDENTS PICK UP THEIR GRADUATION GOWNS?**

Gown pick-up is in the Church Hall. Students should be at the church by 9:00 am.

### **SEATING – ARE THERE LIMITS TO THE NUMBER OF GUESTS? WHAT TIME SHOULD GUESTS ARRIVE?**

Seating is on a first-come, first-served basis. There is seating for approximately 1700 guests.

Guests should arrive in time to be seated in the Sanctuary of the Church by 9:30 am, at the latest, but NOT earlier than 9:00 am. It is inadvisable to invite children under the age of 10.
