About our school

Built in 1919, École Robert H. Smith School is a Nursery to Grade 6 School located in the Winnipeg School Division with both English and French Immersion programming. We are a community of learners, characterized by strong academic programming, environmental stewardship, and integrated performing arts and athletics programs.

École Robert H. Smith School has a student population of 376 students, with 17 classrooms, 24 teachers, 5 educational assistants, 2 office staff and 3 custodians. Our school is home to one of the largest volunteer bases in the division with over 300 volunteers who support our school and students in a variety of ways. We are fortunate to have a privately-run Lunch Program, a Before and After School Program and a Parent Advisory Group (PAG) that works collaboratively with staff and students to support school-based initiatives.

We continue to deepen understanding and implement initiatives that address environmental, social and economic issues both locally and world-wide. Our school was one of the first Manitoban schools to become a "Roots and Shoots" school, affiliated with the Jane Goodall Foundation. In addition, we find authentic ways to embed Indigenous perspectives through community involvement, guest speakers, artists, and partnerships with other schools. We actively teach our students about the harms of the past and ways to move forward in reconciliation.

RHS Priorities for 2019-2020

- Numeracy: Students have been given opportunities to talk about their learning and strategy use in numeracy. They have been expected to demonstrate an understanding of their next steps while working towards independence.
- Literacy:

Students worked toward greater proficiency in writing this year through targeted focus on writing traits, primarily the organization of their ideas, sentence fluency, word choice and writing conventions.

• Strengthening Instructional Practice: Teachers have broadened how they prepare for student learning, including providing feedback, enhancing classroom dialogue and using thinking strategies.



Priorities for 2020-2021

Strengthen instructional and assessment strategies for all students using all available resources including the integration of technology. Examples:

- 1. By June 2021 all students in grades 1-6 will be able to articulate and demonstrate writing strategies in all stages of the writing process.
- 2. By June 2021 teachers will strengthen our mathematicians' core competencies through targeted instruction and mathematical dialogue.
- 3. By June 2021 all teachers will have engaged in professional learning and planning with student growth in mind. Through professional learning communities (PLCs), scheduled grade-group time and coaching, all teachers will incorporate school-wide shared beliefs for literacy and numeracy development.

Additional school priorities include continued efforts to:

- Ensure that a balance of perspectives is presented to our children (with a continued focus on embedding ongoing and authentic Indigenous perspectives)
- Build STEAM programming (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, Math) including active opportunities for designing, building, creating, performing, and coding
- Continue building strategies for self-regulation, including the use of mindfulness practice, school-wide pro-social programs, our sensory pathway and Movement Room
- Enhance oral production in French Immersion, giving students frequent opportunities to speak and share their learning in French

Parent and community

A strength that characterizes our École Robert H. Smith School Community is the commitment and engagement of our parents. The RHS Parent Advisory Group (PAG) plays a vital role in the daily life of our school. From planning events to spearheading fundraising efforts, our parents are avid supporters of our learning and programming.
