SUMMARY: Gives tips for keeping yourself safe when texting and shows what the dangerous consequences might be of not following what might be considered common sense practices when sending messages. Includes dramatizations of situations with negative consequences, including someone who is in a car with a driver who is texting, someone who sends a nude picture (sexting), someone who texts a rumor, someone

who texts to make plans with a friend without confirming the plans by voice, and other scenarios. Audience: Grades 7 - 9. **BOOKING # DVD0642**

Bully bystanders: You can make a difference. Mount Kisco, NY: Human Relations Media; Orangeville, ON: McIntyre Media, c2011. 1 videodisc (17 min., 34 sec.) SUMMARY: Most teens don't like to see their peers bullied but are not sure whether or how to respond. This video offers the empowering message that the most effective way to deal with bullying is through the efforts of those who witness it. Program features a compelling short drama based on real-life incidents where bystanders stand up and change the outcome of a bullying incident. We also hear from real teens discussing incidents where they and their peers made a difference by intervening in a bullying situation. On-screen experts advise teens how they can become proactive without putting themselves at risk. Viewers learn that respecting others and taking a united stand against all sorts of harassment is not only possible, but it can make a dramatic difference in the lives of many young people. For many teenagers, the web is like a second home where they go to talk and catch up with friends. But for some, that home isn't so safe these days because bullies have been coming to call. Hiding behind the anonymity of the Internet, cyber-bullies are setting up abusive websites about certain students and inviting others to join in with lewd and offensive comments. The victims suffer the blows of humiliation every time they log onto the Internet, making their lives unbearable and suffering deep emotional wounds. SUMMARY: A recent survey by the U.S. Department of Justice states that one out of every four kids is bullied in some way--and that estimate, according to other reports, is too conservative. Why is bullying so widespread? What are the various forms it can take? How should a bullying victim react to intimidation and physical aggression, or--ideally--avoid becoming a victim in the first place? This video addresses those questions as it looks at the root causes and potential solutions to bullying dilemmas. SUMMARY: An episode of the television program, The Smart Guy. Two adolescents learn that real-world risks exist in cyberspace. Students will learn specific guidelines to follow in order to avoid danger and minimize risks when using the Internet.

Me and my 500 friends: Staying safe on social networks. [Mount Kisco, NY]: Human Relations Media; Orangeville, ON: McIntyre Media, 2011. 1 videodisc (20 min., 41 sec.) SUMMARY: Program provides teens with a safety primer on using social networks such as Facebook. Through interviews with experts and real-life young people, teens learn that social networks can be a useful tool for communication and connection, but also pose significant risks. Experts discuss how harmful rumors can be spread quickly as well as the danger of cyberbullying, or harassment that occurs through the internet, cell phones, and other technology. The risks of "sexting," or posting sexually explicit images online, are also covered. Viewers can see how "phishers" and identity thieves can glean private information from what you post on social profiles; finally, the risk of encountering sexual predators is emphasized. The program provides important, easy-to-follow rules for keeping information--and oneself--safe while using social networks.

Audience: Grades 7 - 12. BOOKING # DVD1155

Real people: Bullying, the internet and you. Pleasantville, NY: Sunburst Visual Media, c2005. 1 videodisc (22 min.) or 1 videocassette (22 min.) + 1 teacher's guide. SUMMARY: This program is designed for educators to use with teens in order to empower them to use the Internet without fear, and without resorting to mistreating anyone. By presenting the true stories of real teens who were bullied online, it challenges teens to realize that the person at the other end of the "enter" button is a real human being with the same feelings, hopes and needs as they have. Real people: How not to be a victim: Violence prevention. Pleasantville, NY: Sunburst Technology, c2003. 1 videocassette (24 min.) + 1 teacher's guide. SUMMARY: Teaches students how to go to and from school safely; prevent theft of personal property at school; avoid a physical fight; handle a bully; deal with sexual

harassment; be safe when home alone; and use the Internet safely.

A Rose for Livvy: A Story about internet safety for teens. [Plainview, NY]: Distributed by Bureau for At-Risk Youth, c2003. 1 videodisc (29 min.) + 1 leader's guide. SUMMARY: A story about an internet predator and internet danger. A lonely girl develops an online relationship with someone she meets in an internet chat room. The online relationship evolves into a personal encounter at a nearby mall. Unfortunately, the man Livvy meets turns out to be very different than what she expected. This program, based on real-life situations, emphasizes the possible dangers of developing internet relationships.

Research shows that bullying involves both genders, affects youth of every background, and has become more widespread with the help of digital technology. This series helps identify bullying, confront its instigators, and assist victims -- all with the ultimate goal of prevention. What's a bully. [Hawthorne, NY]: Sunburst Visual Media, c2005. 1 videodisc or 1videocassette (17 min., 45 sec.) + 1 teacher's guide.

SUMMARY: Bullies come in all shapes, sizes and genders. This program points out, more often than not the kids who engage in these behaviors usually don't think of themselves as bullies. Using situations that middle-elementary students will readily recognize, the program dramatizes different examples of bullying behavior: physical bullying, teasing with putdowns and taunts, spreading rumors, and harassing with threats and insults over the Internet. The program concludes by urging viewers to examine and think about their own behavior.
