

Our class has been learning about rules and the reasons we need rules in our lives. We also enjoyed learning about pumpkins. In November we will be learning about Remembrance Day and how it is a time to think about peace and war.

We have also been studying emotions and reasons why we feel certain ways. We've practiced identifying different feelings and sharing ways to deal with strong feelings. In our classroom we've learning about mindfulness and practiced different ways to use breathing to help calm our bodies. We use role play to practice different scenarios to handle different situations. For example, someone cuts you in line as we head back to class. What would you do?

We are going to be participating in a program called Roots of Empathy with our school social worker. This program focuses on helping children develop the empathy they need for mental health, learning and caring for others. This program is proven to help reduce aggression/bullying and increase prosocial behaviours.

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
Adventures with Room 8 and Mr. Storey

The students have been learning about what it means to be a citizen of Canada. They are learning that they have rights and responsibilities as citizens.





Greetings Families,




Students have also enjoyed being able to build using a variety of materials such as tape, straws, tooth-picks and candy for our STEM challenges during science. Students were given only 30 minutes to complete tasks with their partners such as creating a platform that would support a small pumpkin, or build the tallest, self-supporting tower. The focus and determination was evident and the level of engagement sky-high for these exercises. Congratulations to all the students who worked with their team-members and collaborated to create their designs.

Students are embarking on a unit of using a variety of strategies to add multi-digit numbers in math and any opportunities at home to use different ways to combine numbers such as counting on or estimating are welcome practice to build students repertoire of strategies in the classroom. But beneath the scars the years had made There remained a smile that refused to fade. A boy came whistling down the street, Bouncing along on care-free feet.


His smile was full of joy and fun,
