We look forward to having the Mobile Vision Clinic at Lord Selkirk School in January. This clinic takes place on one day only, January 11, 2023. Please hand in your forms if you would like your child to participate in getting their eyes checked by an Optometrist.

We are also looking forward to another Pizza Lunch Fundraiser on January 19. Look for envelopes & order slips in your child's backpack in early January with orders due January 13. No orders will be accepted after January 16. These funds are raised to support our Grade 6 Camp.

After each break we review Common Area Expectations for all staff and students at Lord Selkirk School. On January 10, classes will travel in cohorts through the building visiting different common areas. In each area we will review expected behaviours and what the Three B's (Be Safe, Be Respectful, Be Cooperative) look like in the different locations. Students have the opportunity to ask questions and provide feedback. This is a key component of our PBIS (Positive Behaviour Intervention Strategy) approach at Lord Selkirk School.

We hope everyone had a relaxing and restful winter break! We are back and ready to continue our learning for the 2023 school year! We went on our first field trip to the Royal Aviation Museum,. Wow what an amazing experience. Highlights for students was being able to board a real airplane and build Lego cars!

In Readers Workshop, we are continuing our non-fiction reading unit. We are learning about many different animals, sports, and places. We have explored the National Geographic for Kids website to help us learn more about animals. Students are learning about non-fiction text features and are looking out for them while reading their books! Please ensure students return their home reading books on Fridays so they can choose new books on Mondays.

In Writer's Workshop, we are continuing to write facts and information about things we are experts on. We are experts on movies, video games, sports, school, Dreambox and many more topics. I encourage you to ask your child what they are writing about in class. Students are focusing on writing a great lead sentence to help hook the reader! Look out for our next writing celebration to be posted on their Seesaw journals.

In math we have been working on improving our addition skills and learning new strategies to help us solve addition problems. We have been doing fantastic work in Thinking Classrooms and have been very active on Dreambox as well! We have had lots of amazing discussions about different ways to solve math problems, and students are starting to get really creative with their thinking!

We are working on self-regulation strategies as a class and will be participating in partnerships, small groups or large group play to help students become proficient problem solvers.

Please remember to send your child to school with ski pants, toques, mittens and scarves every day. We are looking forward to an amazing January!

Room 7 GRADE 2 Ms. Stern

During the month of December, students in Room 7 have been very busy learning and creating. In Readers Workshop, students have been continuing to learn about the genre of nonfiction. They have used their knowledge of text features to assist them in their scientific research about a variety of animals.

Students spent Writers Workshop revising and editing their non fiction books about an animal of their choice. We planned to have a writing celebration before winter break, but we will see if the students can complete their final copies in time! If not, we will celebrate when we return to school in January.

In Math this month the students have been learning about place value as well as the strategy of using addition to subtract. We practiced the strategy so much that many students who were unsure what to do at first, were able to complete the problems without using any tools! Way to go room 7!

Science, Social Studies and Health were exciting to study in December. We went on our first field trip to the Royal Canadian Aviation Museum. The students were able to experience some hands-on building and they learned about position and motion. They also learned about the many aircraft that are housed at the aviation museum and how the design changes helped these aircraft become modernized and more efficient. We also spent some time collaborating on a house for our wayward elf. It was very nice to see the students cooperating while building these structures.

In January, we may go on community walks during winter and we go for recess daily until the temperature reaches minus 27°C. Should you need any winter gear for your student please communicate with me or our Community Support Worker, Mandi. Also, I have received a stock of books that can be used for home reading. Please watch for these books coming home with your child after winter break!

Room 15

GRADE 2

December has been a fun and busy month in grade two! The students worked on several holiday art projects and have been practicing for our Winter Concert. It will be so nice to see them performing on the stage, I hope you are as excited as they are. I am happy we were able to have the opportunity to discuss your child's progress during student lead conferences or through a phone conversation earlier this month. Ongoing communication and your support is a valuable part of your child's learning journey. I hope we can continue to work together to help your child have a successful learning year.

During our shared reading, the students have been practicing how to read with more fluency and expression. We have been reading informational books and looking at the differences between books that tell stories and books that give us information. We have been examining how various text features (e.g. headings, table of contents, diagrams) help us gain information in our reading. In word study we continue to work on long vowels and did word sort activities to help us build spelling and vocabulary skills.

In math, we worked on understanding increasing/decreasing number patterns and continued our daily oral counting skills. The students have been practicing different strategies for addition and subtraction during number talks.

We continued to study growth and changes in animals during Science time. We have been comparing differences and similarities between animals and learning about the different ways animal take care of their young. In social studies we continue to study our local community of Elmwood and different community helpers.

Room 33 GRADE 3 Ms. Tien

During the month of December, students in Room 33 were hard at work learning in the classroom, practicing for the winter concert and preparing for the P.B.I.S assembly. Our P.B.I.S. skill for the assembly was Accepting Consequences and the Reader's Theater story that we read was the Two Goats on One Narrow Bridge, a story from the country of Cameroon. Great job everyone on the performance!

In Social Studies we started an Inquiry project on the exploration of Mapping the World and Community. Connections. Students have written about a country on which they would like to visit and then have connected it to the diverse ways in which people live. Next month, Room 33 will study Human Rights, where we will learn to recognize that people around the world have basic human rights and about our own personal responsibility.

In our Word Work we have been working on spelling patterns, high frequency words and the different endings in words such as -ing, -ed, -ies and -ly. We are discovering ways to break apart words to spell and to read. In Reading Workshop students have been learning to understand features in nonfiction books (e.g. table of contents and glossary) and pausing after we read a page or "chunk" to recollect everything that we've learned so far. The reason for the pause is to determine importance or to find the main idea. Sometimes there's not just one main idea, but two or three. We have learned that excellent readers will find that main idea by

studying the text carefully and gathering new information to formulate theories. Please encourage your child to continue reading nonfiction books at home and practicing this reading strategy.

Please help me in welcoming Ms. Aggarwal as the new teacher for Room 33. Make sure to say hello during drop offs or pick ups if you are able.

Room 35 GRADE 3 & 4 Mr. Telford

Happy New Year!! I hope that you and your family have a restful holiday season. I am looking forward to spending time with my family and eating too much good food.

Our novel study with Ms. Enns has been so entertaining. Charlie and the Chocolate Factory has been great. The kids are making predictions, summarizing information, and even designing their own chocolate creations! Before the winter break the students watched the movie and compared it to the book.

In Writer's Workshop we took some time to celebrate all of the amazing small moments stories the students published. It was lovely getting to see the students as publishers. Every time we finish a writing unit we will celebrate all of the word that students did.

In the New Year we are going to be exploring multiplication and division strategies! It is always a fun unit to being in grade 3. The students get so excited to begin doing math that the "big kids" learn. We will be starting by using manipulatives to represent equal groups and repeated addition.

Students were so excited to learn a little bit about the countries participating in the world. It is so cool to see the students identify so many different flags from around the world. In term 2, students will get to do a "deep dive" on a country that interests them.

In Science, students are wrapping up the habitats unit by creating their own habitat on Minecraft. They are planning what kind of animals, food, plants, and space their habitat will need to be successful.

As the weather is beginning to get cold and wet, please make sure that your child has a pair of indoor and outdoor shoes/boots, a hat, and mittens. Please talk to your child about your expectations around wearing winter clothing I've noticed many students trying to go outside without warm clothing.



Room 34 GRADE 4 Ms. Balkaran

Happy New Year Everyone! I am wishing everyone a safe and enjoyable winter break! I hope that you are excited for all 2023 will bring. Here are a few things we learned in December:

During Readers Workshop, we completed another class read aloud, "Magic Treehouse: Midnight on the Moon". Together we made predictions, summarized what happened in a chapter and talked about character traits. In our notebooks we have been writing short summaries of what we have been reading during our independent reading time. We reviewed our book selections to make sure we have good fit books and started reading groups. Students voted that in January we read aloud "A Series of Unfortunate Events: The Bad Beginning".

In Writers Workshop, we explored journal writing prompts and story maps this month, trying to reach our writing goal of adding juicy words and writing with as much detail as possible. We wrote winter poems, planned for an ice igloo, answered questions, wrote holiday stories and created new holiday characters. To end the year we wrote Reader's Theatre's scripts and performed them with shadow puppets. In January we'll jump back into persuasive writing.

In Science our "Light" unit brought opportunities for us to study shadows and how they are created.

During Social Studies, we enjoyed learning about the Inuit and communities in Northern Canada. We also selected our Roots and Shoots project. After much deliberation, we have decided to collaborate with Room 40! We know we want to help fight food insecurity in our community! We want to learn how to grow Micro Greens! Micro Greens are packed with nutrients and grow indoors in a short time. We're looking forward to planting and hopefully eating our first harvest this month. Personally, I'm looking forward to finally figuring out how to garden in the wintertime!

In January, Home Reading will continue in Rm. 34! Students are to read for 30 minutes every day - please initial their reading logs to return to school. Have a wonderful start to 2023!

Room 36 GRADE 5 Ms. Millar

Happy New Year! Here is a snapshot of what students in Room 36 will learn to kick off the new year.

In math, students will start the new year exploring fractions and decimals. Students will have the opportunity to use a variety of materials to help them develop meaning for fraction and decimal concepts. It will be exciting for students to discover the relationship between fraction and decimals!

In writer's workshop, before the winter break students finalized research for their "Maintaining a Healthy Body" information books, which also relates to science study. They have been creating text features to help readers locate information in the text, and teach readers about key terms about the topic. Some of these text features include subtopics, interesting facts, table of contents, a glossary, and visual representations. To wrap up this unit, students will make a final copy and then we will share our books with one another at our writer's celebration! Our next writer's unit will focus on memoirs.

Following the winter break, in reader's workshop, we will take a deep dive into word work. There will be hands-on learning opportunities that allow students to practice spelling, building words using letter sounds, blends, vowels and other word patterns such as syllables and suffixes. This will help all of us become better readers, writers and spellers. Students have also been sent home with a book and a reading log to track their daily reading. They are encouraged to read for 10 minutes a night.

In Social Studies, students will learn about the Fur Trade. They will explore the influence of the fur trade on the historical development of Canada, the Hudson's Bay Company and North West Company, as well as the rise of the Métis Nation.

Room 25 GRADE 5 Mr. Frank

Students in Room 25 have been working hard and have a lot to celebrate for the month of January!

We are currently studying non-fiction books in Room 25. Students are learning about different strategies to "level up" their non-fiction reading, and have chosen books of interest. There are many topics being learned about including animal defenses, the Titanic, and Greek mythology.

Students in room 25 have been weighing the pros and cons of the nutritional value of chocolate milk! They are crafting arguments for whether chocolate milk should or should not be banned from schools. It has been especially exciting to hear students differing opinions, gather evidence, and craft essays. We will continue our essay writing into January.

"Algebra!?" is what the class shouted when I introduced our new unit. Although it felt intimidating at first, students have become masters at finding unknowns! Just ask them, "6y = 36" or "47 = 12 + y"

In December students learned all about their bodies, including how to keep their body healthy with nutrition, and the different body systems.

I hope you have a wonderful winter break. Looking forward to lots of learning in January!





Room 27 GRADE 6 Mr. Rodrigues

I'd like to wish all of the Room 27 families a great winter break and holiday season. The new year will bring some exciting opportunities for students: the Grade 6 team has been approved to go to Camp Stevens from June 7th-9th. You can look forward to learning all about this in the new year!

We did a lot of writing in December! We learned about different styles of poetry and also worked on informational pieces related to our Science and Social Studies learning. A research project that we worked on was exploring the Seven Sacred Teachings and creating artwork to share our learning. In January, we will learn about literary essays and also continue our guided reading groups.



In math we continued to explore the multiplication and division of double-digit numbers as well as area and perimeter of objects. In December, students completed an activity of mapping out a restaurant floor plan and determining the area of the restaurant as well as the area required for all the furniture in the restaurant. In January, we will begin exploring fractions.

Room 30 GRADE 6 Ms. Ladouceur

Happy New Year students & families! We will begin our year enjoying some new furniture for our classroom. A big shout out to Ms. Johnston for arranging this. In addition, we will review our classroom expectations and work on setting a personal goal for 2023.

Our next reading and writing units are centered around arguments and advocacy. Students will research both sides of highly debatable issues (Should humans explore deep space or the deep ocean? Are zoo's harmful or helpful to animals?) This will be an opportunity for students to take time researching an issue and exercise their critical thinking skills. Similar to the previous unit of reading and writing, students will keep track of their sources, and explore the writers behind those texts. At the end of each unit, we will hold debates in front of a panel of students, to share our learning.

In Math workshop, we will continue to develop multiplication and division strategies with a focus around factors, multiples, and prime numbers. Fractions will be another focus for the month of January and continue on for the rest of the school year.

We are excited to announce our Roots & Shoots project for this year. The students of room 30 have decided to host an art show and donate the proceeds to K9 advocates. Our planning begins in January and we aim to host the art sale in late April or early May.

In January, please ensure that students continue to dress for the weather. If mittens, toques, or neck warmers are needed, we have those items in our family room at school. We encourage students to have two pairs of shoes so that their feet aren't cold and wet throughout the day. Thank you so much for your support!

This school year has been zooming by. We had a wonderful end of 2022 with the Nursery to Grade 3 Winter Concert. Thank you to all of the families who came and watched and thank you to the staff and volunteers who helped put it together. A huge congratulations to all of the students who performed. Each of you worked hard on your songs and actions and I was very proud of you all!



Grade 4-6 students participated in Traditional Indigenous Oral Teachings; learning and sharing animal stories from the West Coast. At Lord Selkirk School, we use the Zones of Regulation in every classroom. It is a schoolwide approach to encouraging selfregulation and every staff member uses common language to support the students in remembering to use their Zones strategies. Our goal is to teach all of our

student's good coping strategies so they can help themselves when they experience big feelings such as anger, frustration and sadness. By teaching children how to cope with big feelings, we help build resilience so they know how to help themselves in times of stress.

Through Zones of Regulation, we teach the students to:

- Recognize what zone they are in and use strategies that they find useful to help them get into the green zone.
- Increase their emotional vocabulary so they can explain how they are feeling.
- Develop an insight into what triggers lead them into the yellow or red zone.
- Develop problem-solving skills and resilience.
- Create a personalized "toolkit" of strategies that support them.

What are the different zones?

Blue Zone: Low mood. Not ready to learn. Feeling sad, sick, tired, bored and moving slowly.

Green Zone: In a calm state and ready to learn. Feeling happy, calm and focused.

Yellow Zone: Beginning to feel escalated, moving into big emotions, feeling a loss of control. Feeling frustrated, worried, excited.

Red Zone: Out of control, in a heightened state of emotions. Feeling mad, angry, terrified- yelling, hitting or throwing things.

How you can support Zones at home:

- Identify your own feelings using Zones language in front of your child (ex. I am frustrated, I think I am in the yellow zone).
- Talk about what tool or strategy you will use to get back to the green zone (ex. I think I will do some deep breathing to help me get back to green).
- · At times, ask your child what zone they are in, especially when they are feeling big emotions.
- Teach your child tools that they can use with you at home. (Ex. It's time for bed, let's read a book to get you into the blue zone)
- Praise and encourage your child when they share which zone they are in.

Does your home library offer ...?

- A variety of books? Kids love to read all sorts of materials, including books, magazines, newspapers, and poems. Consider including travel brochures, street maps, and programs from school plays.
- * Books written at a variety of reading levels? It is important to have some books that are easy for your child to read, but it is also good to have some that can be read with an adult. This balance enables your child to feel confident with some books, grow as a reader with others, and a chance to connect over a book!
- * Some method of organization? Sometimes grouping books by topic or series helps your child find other books they might like to read. Grouping books using book baskets also help kids find a book more easily than a crowded shelf.
- * Lots of nonfiction material? Even the youngest readers love to read about real places and things. These materials often include photographs, maps and charts full of interesting information.
- Lots of choice? Find creative ways to add books to your library. Playgroup book swaps, yard sales, and used book stores all offer affordable ways to add to your collection. The Lord Selkirk Little Library, outside the front of the school!


