

Principal's Message



We would like to welcome all our new students and their families to our wonderful school community. Lord Selkirk School is a great place to learn and grow. We have had a fantastic start to our school year! Every classroom has created a respect agreement. These are the expectations that students have committed to following in the classroom throughout the school year. All respect agreements are anchored in our three B's. **Be Safe, Be Respectful and Be Cooperative.** As a PBIS school, students participated in common area expectations learning about the 3 B's in all areas of the school (i.e. nutrition room, playground, office, etc.). We will review common area expectations again after winter break and spring break. At the beginning of the month we hosted our first PBIS assembly. Students learned about the skill, "Introducing Yourself." Students have been practicing this skill throughout the month. At our next assembly two students from every classroom will be recognized for practicing this skill and they will receive a Cougar Pride Award for demonstrating leadership.

As a caregiver in our community there are lots of ways to get involved in school life. We encourage caregivers to consider joining our Parent Council. October 18th at 1:30 p.m. is the next Parent Council meeting, which will include the annual elections. Parent Council is also responsible for the operation of the school lunch program. We would like to acknowledge the great work of the Lunch Program Coordinator, Michelle Smith and all the lunch program staff. In the morning, students are to meet their classroom teachers at their designated pylon outside. The bell rings at 8:50 a.m. for students to enter the building. After 9:00 a.m. students will need to enter through the front doors. They will report to the office to check in and receive a welcome slip before going to class.

Please be aware that we have a **life threatening peanut and egg allergy** in our room. Use special care to avoid sending these foods to our class. Student fees are 35 dollars and are due by Sept 29th- please pay them. Finally if you would like to speak with me about your child I am available at the end of every school day at pick up time. If you would like to speak with Ms. Boroski she dismisses the students at 12:00 p.m.

GRADE 1 & 2

Room 4

What a great start to the new school year!! Room 4 students are curious learners, collaborative partners and creative children. We have spent some time getting to know our friends and learning school routines. Students have reviewed our school rules: Be Safe, Be Respectful and Be Co-operative. We have been learning about growth mindset and talking about ways we can make some changes to ensure we have awesome days of learning.

Mrs. Gonzales teaches English Language Arts (Reading and Writing), Social Studies and Health in the mornings. Ms. Herget teaches Math, Science and Visual Arts in the afternoons. Please ensure your child comes to school on time. The breakfast club starts daily at 8:30 a.m. Mrs. Gonzales will often be in the nutrition room to eat breakfast as well. In health, we are learning about healthy and active lifestyles. Eating breakfast is a great way to start our learning days.

We have started our writing and reading workshop. In writing, students are writing small moment stories and making sure they include a beginning, middle and end to their story. I love reading their stories and getting a glimpse into their lives through their lens. In reading, students are learning letter sounds and segmenting and blending sounds together to read words and building our reading stamina for longer periods of time each week. We will begin our home reading program this month. Please look for the handout for more information. Thank you for dedicating time every evening to read with your child. Dedicating around 10-15 minutes every evening is great.

We will continue to go on Community walks this month to help us determine our Roots and Shoots project for the year. In Social Studies, we are learning about our Elmwood community and the different communities we belong to. We are looking for changes occurring in the environment and in animals around our community. Please ensure your child is dressed for the weather with layers. As the weather is getting cooler, please ensure they have mitts and toques/hats to keep them warm.

The mathematicians in room 4 have been doing some great thinking during Thinking Classrooms and are learning to share their ideas with their peers on classroom whiteboards. We are working on skip counting by 5s and 10s to 100, and 2s to 30 forward and backward and start off each afternoon with a Number Talk. Our Dreambox classroom is up and running for the 2022-23 school year! Students can log into Dreambox at home using this code: https://play.dreambox.com/login/d7qd/lords. They can click on "Room 4" and use their picture passwords to log in.

In science we have been learning about the characteristics and needs of living things. We had great small-group and full class discussions about different types of living things, and what they need to survive and thrive in their environments.

Awesome job room 4 students! We are excited to watch everyone learn and grow in room 4 this year!!

Room 15

Dear Families of Room 15.

The students in room 15 are off to a great start this school year! The students have reconnected with classmates and welcomed new friends into our classroom community. Thank you to all of the families who came to meet with me at the beginning of September, it was nice to be able to see you in person. We have spent our first month of school establishing daily routines, building community within our classroom, and establishing our classroom respect agreement. This respect agreement will be a reminder to be safe, be respectful and be cooperative. Our classroom's golden rule is "treat others the way you want to be treated."

We are building our stamina during "Read to Self" (independent reading time) and we are excited about becoming authors while working on Small Moment stories during Writer's Workshop. We have been thinking about our learning from the previous year and have been reviewing letter sounds, letter blends and ending sounds so that we can use all that we know to read help us read tricky words in our reading.

In Math, we have been discussing how we use numbers in daily life. We have been reviewing how to solve addition and subtraction to solve number problems, building and adding doubles and using our 100 chart to help us count forward and backward starting at different numbers.

In Social Studies we are talking about our community and the people and places that belong to Elmwood community. In Science we are starting to investigate different animal groups and the similarities and differences between them.

It has been a wonderful start to the 2022-2023 school year and students have been working hard in the classroom. We have been working on our Classroom Respect Agreement, sharing our stories, participating in community walks and building our classroom community.

In Writer's Workshop we are rehearsing for writing by collecting lots of quick drafts in our notebooks and choosing one that we want to put through the writing and editing process. We started the unit off with setting personal writing goals for ourselves and writing "bit by bit." This month we will continue to craft our true stories by storytelling and trying out our stories in different ways such as making a mental movie of what happened and "showing" our readers what happened instead of summarizing. We will also be engaging in different pumpkin, Halloween and Thanksgiving activities throughout the month which will tie into our Math, Science and Health units.

A big thank you to parents and caregivers for ensuring your child/children are at school everyday and on time. Attendance is crucial to every student's success, and we are off to a great start!

Hello 5th Grade Families! It has been such a great start to the year and we have been enjoying building our classroom community. We are looking forward to another fun-filled month in October!

What We Are Working On

Math

In math we have been going over Thinking Classrooms expectations as this is a model that we will be using to help us problem solve, think critically and risk take in mathematics. Each student is put into randomized groups and they work with their peers and show their thinking on vertical surfaces (white boards, windows). We have just began representing and describing whole numbers and this unit will continue to be our focus throughout October.

Reading

The students have begun work on demonstrating understanding of texts read aloud to them by responding to questions and having group discussions about the books. Students have been working on providing evidence and justifications for their ideas and opinions. At the end of each day students get the opportunity to independently read a book of their choice that they choose from the school library. We have been loving exploring all of the different genres.

Writing

In Writer's Workshop we have launched into our first Writing unit. We will be spending the month of October generating Personal Narratives by using strategies such as, thinking of a small moment story that connects to a person that matters to us, that relates to first times, last times or times we realized something, and by thinking of a strong feeling and sharing a story about that time. Students are learning that writers of stories climb into the story, walking in the shoes of the character, experiencing the story as it unfolds and putting that onto the page so readers can experience it too.

Social Studies

In Social Studies, students are exploring First People's' ways of life with a focus on leadership, culture, communities, traditional territories and connections with the natural environment.



Lord Selkirk Lunch Program

The Lord Selkirk Lunch program is operated under the direction of the Parent Council and overseen by a Lord Program Coordinator. The lunch program operates on a non-profit basis, however, there is a charge to cover the cost of supervision for each child. Fees can be paid monthly or annually.

Lunch Program Fees

1 child - \$25/month; 2 children - \$45/month; 3 children - \$65/month

Lunch program provides lunch hour supervision from 12:00 p.m. to 12:55 p.m. with a 30 minute outdoor recess dependent on weather. Spots in the lunch program are for students in grades 1 to 6. Spots are limited.

Safe Arrival

At Winnipeg School Division, one of our greatest priorities is ensuring that all our students arrive safely to school each and every day. As a part of our safe arrival process, a daily absence check is conducted by staff. Our absence reporting system is called *SafeArrival*. It allows parents to report their child's absence quickly and conveniently in one of three ways:

- 1. Parents can call into an automated interactive telephone system via a toll free number (1-855-278-4513) through which absences can be reported.
- 2. Parents can log into a website, https://go.schoolmessenger.ca to authenticate their Portal account to report absences and update contact information.
- 3. Parents who have authenticated their accounts and have either an iOS or Android device can download an app that can be used to report absences.

The system is available 24 hours/day, 7 days a week.

Future Absences Can Be Reported At Any Time.

This process includes an automated notification system that will contact parents who have not reported their child absent. The automated notification system will contact parents at multiple contact numbers until one of the designated contacts is reached.

By reporting your child absent in advance using Safe Arrival, you will **NOT** receive a call.

All absences and late arrival reporting must go through the toll free number. Please do not contact or send notes to the school or classroom teacher to report an absence or late arrival.

To assist you in using this easy system, we have sent home a business card, containing the toll free number that you can keep in a convenient location for quick reference when reporting your child's absence or late arrival. Additional copies are available in the office

Indicated by the sign shown here, school zones surround schools with children in Kindergarten up to grade eight.

Vehicles parked illegally during school pick up and drop off times create serious safety hazards for children and cause traffic delays. It's especially important to pay attention to and abide by all signage and rules of the road around schools.
