ABOUT OUR SCHOOL

Greenway School is an elementary school located in the beautiful West End community of the Winnipeg School Division. Our school population of 360 students reflects the cultural diversity of the city. We provide programming for children from Nursery to Grade 6 and house four programs for students with Exceptional Needs. Our vision at Greenway Elementary school is to provide a safe and inclusive environment where ALL students feel a sense of belonging and are encouraged to be curious, ask questions and take risks with their learning. We are a PBIS school (Positive Behaviour Interventions and Strategies) and are committed to our motto: Be Safe, Be Respectful and Be a Learner (also known as The 3 B's). We continue to strive to maintain our connection with the land and have completed our 6th year as a Jane Goodall Roots and Shoots school. Each year, we complete a student-led inquiry study in our community to help the environment, the animals and people. We are very proud of the initiatives that students have worked on.

SCHOOL HIGHLIGHTS for 2021-2022

The 2021-22 school year began with the 'Provincial Pandemic Response Orange'. Amongst the many provincial guidelines, classrooms continued to maintain 2 meter spacing between students as well as adhere to the provincial mask mandate—both of which proved to be most impactful on student interactions. These conditions sustained us until late December/early January when the COVID-19 Omicron wave hit. At which point the return to school was delayed until January 10th and shifted into remote learning for the following week. After months of sustained impact on community health and student and staff attendance, the situation leveled off by spring break. During this time, Greenway hosted three student vaccination clinics and one for the wider community.

Fortunately, the onset of spring saw the easing of public health restrictions and Greenway was able to get back to some of our 'normal' activities and events. To kick off spring break, we hosted a 'Spirit Week' and a virtual talent show; both of which were embraced by students and staff as a harbinger of spring. Not to get too comfortable, Mother Nature dealt our province a blow. Due to the expected severity of a forecasted storm, all metro schools were closed for 2 days prior to the Easter weekend.

The latter part of the year saw many more opportunities for student engagement and activities. Our Breakfast Club was launched on May 3rd—with sustained attendance through the remainder of the year. Classes began to reconfigure their spaces to support collaborative learning. Field trips were enjoyed by many classes, with visits to the Zoo, Minto Armory, MTYP, community walks, swimming, the Forks, and Manitoba Museum. Students also took in intramural sports, running club, compost group, Jump Rope for Heart, Special Olympics, Dancing in the Field, Ultimate Football, Soccer Clinic, Roots and Shoots celebration and showcase, a community BBQ, a pop-up visit from the Winnipeg Art Gallery's Inuit art exhibition "Nakatamaakewin", as well as an in person grade six farewell. Evermore's After-School program continued four days a week virtually from Monday to Thursday. Many of our students were regular attenders. The WSD EAL program was held in July at our school. It was a great success and will be continuing this year.
