



### Priority #1 -

### Instructional and Assessment strategies in numeracy and literacy

To improve academic success for all learners with an emphasis on literacy, math, the arts and technology. Examples include:

- Involvement of Early Years Support Teacher to support numeracy.
- Talk-To-Me and ELF Programs for N/K (SLP)
- Targeted Math and Literacy groups
- Use of a variety of technology to support numeracy and literacy. This includes iPads, Chromebooks, interactive white boards and laptops.
- Use of a variety of online platforms to support numeracy and literacy. This includes SeeSaw, Google Classroom, Raz Kids and Readworks
- Involvement of Literacy Intervention Support Teacher with Elementary classes
- Developing Mental Math Strategies Resource Document continuum from Grades N – 8.
- N-8 use of school developed reading comprehension continuum to support instruction and assessment

- Cultural groups to promote diversity for all students
- Students for Inclusion and Diversity student group (SID's Kids)
- Implementing a Positive Behaviour Intervention Program
- Recovery learning. As students have continued to move between in school and remote learning this year, we will continue to seek to provide a safe and caring learning environment for them to reengage school in the fall. We acknowledge the diversity of student experiences during the pandemic, and recognize the academic, social, emotional and mental health needs of students and families as they return to the school.


# Parent and community involvement

“Our Gathering Place” Parent Centre is typically a way for our parents to form a partnership with our school. This year, our Support Worker/Community Connector has supported parent learning in a variety of ways that have looked quite a bit different due to the pandemic. Zumba classes, Nutrition Bingo and Dads Matter programs have moved to virtual meetings but have continued to engage our community. We have also participated in the division’s food rescue program which has provided weekly groceries for our families. This has included eggs, potatoes, onions, french fries and many other food items which were either delivered to homes or picked up by families at the school. Shaughnessy Park continues to work with Norwest Access and the Food Centre. Our support staff conducted weekly visits to families in the community to support remote learning and mental health for our families. We are working together to provide services to our families, strengthen our community and work towards maintaining a safe community.
