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
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Hot Air and Nonsense - the NDP-Liberal Agreement Explained

The majority government, in all of its arrogance and strength, represents the standard form in Canada. Since confederation, only thirteen administrations have stood without their party holding an outright majority in the parliament (1), yet budgets have passed, and Prime Ministers have governed. The only way one party can govern as a minority and still expect to survive the very first confidence vote is with the support of members of the opposition. Thus, an arrangement necessary to the functioning of democracy is that of cross-party cooperation. However, only once, in 1917, was a formal coalition formed at the federal level in Canada, led by Conservative Sir Robert Borden, to strengthen the government's hand on the issue of conscription during the First World War, amid widespread opposition in Québec (2).

A coalition involves multiple parties joining to form a government. Seats in cabinet are divided, cooperation is formal; the agreement reached between the Liberals and the NDP in late March is not a coalition (3). Instead, it involves a supply and confidence agreement, whereby the NDP has pledged not to topple the government and to "supply" votes on confidence motions, in exchange for policy concessions from the Liberals (4). In this case, the Liberals have agreed to a national low income dental care plan and a universal national pharmacare plan (4). As usual, the devil is in the details. For starters, the pharmacare plan is not yet released, and yet already the pharmaceuticals industry has attempted to insert themselves into the process, a risk worth noting (5). This is, however, only a minor concern compared to the new federal budget, the first real test of the deal. A budget is the federal government's plan on spending and revenue for the year, outlining where the money goes, and where it comes from. The NDP has agreed to support the budget, despite the billions of dollars in tax breaks and subsidies that go to the oil and gas sector, theoretically to pay for decarbonisation (6). This raises two fundamental questions: first, why not have an industry that has made many billions of dollars over the pandemic pay for going green themselves (7), and second, why would the continued mass production of oil and gas even be a part of a "green" economy?

The budget is in a deficit, and it does contain some new programs, such as a much needed but not nearly sturdy enough housing plan (4), but even fairly moderate, common sense policies have been too much for an endless stream of whiners claiming that Canada "cannot afford" to do anything at all, and even that the Liberals have sent Canada into a financial crisis (8). This budget and the supply and confidence agreement mentioned, as well as the surrounding debate surrounding them highlights a fundamental problem in Canadian politics and society. A growing inequality is eroding the very foundations of our country, as wealth is becoming more and more concentrated in the hands of the very rich, who, acting only in their own best interests, have pushed to accelerate such trends (9). The union, an institution that is absolutely fundamental to a free and democratic society, a force against that inequality and a shield by which workers may defend themselves, has been under assault for forty years, with membership bleeding and wages stagnant, as prices rise and working families drown (10). Rapid climate change has threatened to destroy the world. How is that for a crisis?

The situation is not hopeless. There are some signs that labour has some life in it yet still (10), and Canada's carbon emissions peaked in 2007 (11). However, things will not improve unless we want them to, and unless we fight, like we have never fought before. The NDP has signed off on an agreement and a budget that will lead to barely incremental change, which the Liberals likely would have pursued anyways. The New Democrats, once the party of the farmers and the workers, has metamorphosed into something hardly distinguishable

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from the Liberals. While realism and pragmatism are necessary, such things are often excuses to stifle the good fight, the fight that is required to fix our problems, against a tide of centrist windbags and a corporate elite that will defend the status quo until the sun engulfs the Earth. Moderate concessions are not enough. This is the challenge of our generation, and it is one that we will either meet or be destroyed by.

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

Manitoba's New Music

Manitoba has always been the birthplace of excellent art, but especially recently the music scene in this province has flourished. The following are some of the emerging artists in Manitoba that span a wide variety of genres and tones, so have a listen if you're looking for something new! These artists are constantly releasing new music and having gigs in local venues, so be sure to keep your eyes on some of these names in the future.

Veneer

Coming together in soft harmonies and gentle guitars, this Winnipeg band embraces the simplicity of a good melody without getting boring. Listening to *Veneer* will take you far away from your overdue homework and transport you to a cute cafe somewhere in the Exchange, or maybe to the planet Venus. The carefree vocals are ones to sweep you off your feet, rivalling those of artists like Phoebe Bridgers or Girlpool. Veneer's music is composed of countless layers of smooth, atmospheric riffs, and flourishing melodies.

Favourite tracks: Don't Get My Hair Wet, Bianca Casual

Zoon

As described by Daniel Monkman, the creative mind behind *Zoon*, this music is "moccasin-gaze", a spitting image of My Bloody Valentine circa 1991. The sounds created by Zoon are those of swirly guitars, fuzzy riffs, and dreamy vocals. The cool, mellow tracks are perfect for raves in the kitchen or catching the bus in the rain. Monkman works well on their own, but often collaborates with other artists, achieving a wide variety of sounds and styles.

Favourite tracks: Vibrant Colours, Light Prism, Cherry Coke

Rainy Day Ritual

With music that has a piercing yet ambient tonality, Wakeman has come to greet the music scene with trippy rhythms and captivating synthesised melodies. Without overdoing it, Wakeman creates an atmosphere of psychedelia and unapologetic electronica. The encompassing sound of *Rainy Day Ritual* will not fail to fill the air with every colour of the aurora borealis. Just by listening, you can tell that Wakeman could (and would) sit you down and tell you all about his favourite synthesisers.

Favourite tracks: Standard., Terra, Infinite.

Caid Jones

This young hip hop artist tells a story in every song with skillful narrative style. His words are quick, but each is meaningful. Through the way he raps, it's evident that Jones is passionate about his music, as well as his community. Jones circles around themes of Iindigenous perseverance and resilience, as well his story as an emerging artist. His songs are expertly mixed, complete with catchy hooks and infectious rhythms.

Sophie Stevens

The prep presented in Sophie Steven's two released singles is undeniable. Stevens has a voice that sounds like it's smiling through their singing, dazzling wonderfully through intricate ornamentations. Their music is a delightful blend of folk and power pop, complete with harmonies that sound like the first snow. The clear imagery presented in the often melancholy lyrics starkly contrasts the happy, poppy

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melodies of each tune. Sophie Stevens has given us songs that could either play in the background of a late night study sesh, or blast in the car with the windows rolled down.

Ethan Lyric

The young musician Ethan Lyric has presented the world with music that sounds like a kiss from the night sky. His folksy, acoustic songs are gentle and sweet; Lyric has created an array of summertime lullabies for the modern teenager. Lyric's music is calm, not rushed, taking its time moseying around pleasant plucking patterns on his acoustic guitar, often paired with minimal accompaniment. Reviews and Recommendations

The White Album by Joan Didion

Joan Didion is known for her precise writing and insight. In this collection of essays, Didion examines the trends and prolific events of Hollywood in the 1960s and their aftermaths. The White Album discusses the impact of the events that took place with the Manson family and the fear that erupted in Hollywood shortly after. Didon's writing reflects the time period and gives readers insight into the paranoia and almost disoriented feeling of Hollywood during this time. The book's other essays discuss trends in the 60s, like drugs, shopping malls and rock music. Didion also discusses the Black Panther Party and music figures like Jim Morrison and Janis Joplin. Didion looks at the painter Georgia O'Keeffe's work, specifically how her work was inspired from where she had been, much like Didion's own writings. The White Album is full of essays and criticisms that put the 60s into a different lens, one many may not have looked through before.

Didion writes a lot about her own life and experiences in California during the 60s and 70s so *The White Album* naturally follows that path. Didion will write about her subjects and then tie in an experience of her own. *The White Album* reflects both the paranoia and spirit of California.

Everything I Know About Love by Dolly Alderton

This memoir is one of the most interesting and realistic I have ever read. Alderton intertwines moments of her life while exploring her journey with self-worth and acceptance. This memoir discusses the journey of growing up with nuance and relatability, aspects which are important for a memoir to be engaging. Alderton explores stories of her life with observations of the world around her.

This was a very quick read, due to the writing style being relatively fast paced and easy to get through. While memoirs might not be for everyone, I really recommend this one, partly because it's very funny but also because it's able to not take itself so seriously.

Alderton writes like she's having a conversation with you. There will be a chapter about a recent break-up she is going through, followed by a recipe for how to make something, or a packing list. The book doesn't just focus on the topic of love. It discusses growing up, the awkwardness of being a teenager and why female friendship is so important. The books discusses the nuances of growing up, like growing out of people. *Everything I Know About Love* discusses experiences women might have which makes it relatable. Alderton writes with exaggeration but is able to capture everything so perfectly.

Funny Weather: Art in an Emergency by Olivia Laing


This is another collection of essays, but these essays are about art - how it shapes our culture and t impacted it had on our society. Olivia Laing includes some of her own essays that aren't art related but are interesting to read nonetheless. Among the many artist written about in this memoir are Jean-Micheal Basquiat and his influence in the art scene of the 80s and Agnes Martin's grid paintings. Laing also discusses art in the form of literature, from Sally Rooney's Normal People to Maggie Nelson's The Argonauts, musing about the ideas of these books and their significance in the world today. While the underlying theme of these essays is exploring the importance of art in the artist's current political scene, the essays also give a look into the artists' personal lives and their art as a whole.

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Happy Hour by Marlowe Granados

This book follows the main character Isa as she and her friend Gala live their lives in New York. The book focuses on female friendship and Isa talks about the joys of her life, like how fun it is to get dressed up to go out, while also touching on things like pretty privilege and power dynamics. This book was slow to get into, which was to be expected with the way the storytelling is formatted. The format was written as Isa's diary entries and the writing was very detailed, which made it difficult to really understand. The book is very character driven and follows how Isa and Gala are able to use their charm to keep a float and have some sort of social standing. Granados's storytelling is very descriptive and full of dry humour. I recommend this book to anyone who wants a fun slow-paced novel to read this spring or summer.

Vegan Vanilla Cake

Ingredients

For the vanilla cake:

- $1 \frac{3}{4}$ cups flour
- 1 cup white sugar
- 1 tsp baking soda
- $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp salt
- 1 cup non-dairy milk
- 2 tsp vanilla extract
- 1/3 cup vegetable oil
- 1 tbsp apple cider vinegar

For the vanilla frosting:

- 3 ³/₄ cups powdered sugar
- 3 Tbsp vegan butter or margarine
- 4 Tbsp non-dairy milk
- 2 tsp vanilla extract

For decoration:

- Anything you will like to add (I personally like to add fresh strawberries or any other berry, but you could add chocolate chips, sprinkles or any candy)

Instructions

Preheat the oven to 350°F (180°C).

Sift the flour into a mixing bowl and add the sugar, baking soda and salt. Mix together.

Add the soy milk, vanilla, oil, and vinegar. Then, give it a quick whisk with a hand whisk until just combined.

Pour the batter into the pans.

Bake for 25-30 minutes or until a toothpick inserted into the centre of one of the cakes comes out clean.

Let the cakes cool in the pans for a few minutes before transferring them to a wire cooling rack to cool completely.

Frosting

Add the powdered sugar, vegan butter, vanilla and half of the soy milk.

Beginning on low speed, mix with an electric mixer, slowly increasing speed. Add the rest of the soy milk, but only as much as needed; until it is smooth and creamy. If your vegan butter has a higher water content you may not need to use all of the soy milk.

If your frosting is still a little thin, add more powdered sugar. If it's a little thick, add more soy milk (one tiny drop at a time). The consistency must be thick enough that it doesn't slide off the cake, but still thin enough to be spreadable.

When your cake is completely cool, add frosting to the top of it.
